COUNTY AUDITING.

So much has been said about the auditing proposition that we feel it is really unnecessary to add more, but it seems that the question gets twisted around in so many ways, that now and then it requires a little straightening out. It has always been our endeavor to be fair and honest with the people, and try to lead them to intelligent and right conclusions, that they may govern their acts accordingly.

So once more we will mention the auditing question, hoping that after awhile the people will become thoroughly educated in the true merits of the case from a wise and sane standpoint.

Now, the Argus is making demands on the candidates for statements to the effect that they are or are not in favor of auditing the books. It looks like the Argus is trying to get the candidates to boost the Argus on its stand heretofore taken on the auditing business, for certainly a candidate's idea about auditing the books should not disqualify him or qualify him for office.

This question might properly be put to the candidates for county judge as they if elected might have to deal directly with the proposition, but what has the coroner, public administrator and other officers got to do with auditing the county books? The Argus might as well ask each candidate what he thinks about infant baptism as to ask them what they think about auditing the books. The question of auditing the books is solely a matter for the consideration and de-

termination of the county court. We think that the court would not be justified in ordering the books audited upon the petition of less than a majority of the voters of the county unless it first be shown to the court that some defalcation exists. Surely the books ought not be audited at a great expense to the county because somebody would like to see it done. The county court in appropriating money to audit the books are dealing with the people's money and they should have some reason or cause for their action. The mere request that the books be audited is not sufficient. The records are always open to public inspection, and if the county court can be shown that some officer has not properly accounted for the county's money or that there are errors made by any officer in his books the county court would have cause to order the auditing of the books of such officer, otherwise the auditing of such books should continue to be done in the usual way prescribed by law. However, if a majority of the voters of the county petition the county court to audit the books of the officers at the expense of the county, regardless of whether there is any known defalcation or error in the books of such officers, the court should grant such request, provided, they are authorized by law to expend the county's money for such purpose, because the majority should rule. "The almost universal feeling among democrats is, as it should be, that the majority should rule. Why should not the majority rule? Why should not the common sense and common judgment of Americans of all parties apply and be enforced, that the majority shall control? In state, county and city conventions, in legislative bodies, state and national; in fact, everywhere, the voice of the majority is dominant and conclusive. And that is something the American people approve instinctively and inevitably, for that is the very basis of our political system."—W. J. Stone.

Until some satisfactory showing is made to the county court that somebody has done something crooked, or a majority of the voters of the county by petition request the auditing of the books, we are opposed to the county court appropriating money for same. We also think the court, should it be necessary to have the books audited, ought to be clearly assured of an auditing that will be strictly fair and impartial both to the county and officers, otherwise the auditing would be a waste of means and accomplish no salutary purpose.

GUESSING IT OFF.

The old habit of guessing off advertising space in this county is bound to come to a close.

The newspapers must necessarily learn, sooner or later, that it costs so much per inch to produce the paper, and that 10 cents per inch per issue is a very fair rate, while one issue or special matter and special position is worth more. Figure on the cost of producing the paper and see if this is not correct.

The subscription and advertis-

ing must produce the paper, else it is a failure.

We can remember when the old papers of the county simply "guessed off" everything, having no fixed scale of prices, and some of them are still doing work at the same price received 10 to 20 years ago, while everything else has increased 50 to 100 per cent or more.

It is up to the newspapers themselves to keep up with the times, or go out of business.

No business can be conducted long at a time on a losing basis, hence so many newspaper failures.

For our part, we are in the newspaper business to stay, and as fast as possible we are going to adjust our prices up to a living scale.

Who will follow?

WHO'S TO BLAME?

The public highways of the country and the streets of the cities are for all the people, for public travel, and certain laws are made to regulate same for the safety and welfare of the people.

These public pass ways are not to be monopolized, not to be obstructed, and not to be used for sport, fast traveling or speedways.

Just at present there is a prejudice among the people against automobiles and motorcycles, which of course have as much right to legitimate travel as any other vehicle, but the trouble is, the greater portion of their travel is for pleasure, passtime, sport and joy riding, and in too many instances the great desire for speed consumes their better judgement until the rights of the public are entirely disregarded. It is this that enangers the public.

Of course much trouble is caused by the people disrespecting the rights of the machines, failing to give their part of the road and in insulting and abusing them, which makes the man in the machine resentful. Due respect and regard is due as much from one as the other.

It is annoying to the residents, to the Sunday schools and to the churches, as well as to the traveling public to be bothered with the noise, puffing, popping and spurring of gasoline engines round-and-round-and-round on the same street every two or three minutes, especially when it is the same machine.

The ordinances of Hayti fix the speed limit for such machines at 12 miles an hour. City Marshal Dewey is being cursed black and blue for trying to enforce this ordinance, as he is under oath of office to do, and if the city does not want its ordinances enforced it was foolish to pay out \$314.00 to get up a new set of ordinances.

Our ordinances are good, and every city official should abide by them to the letter.
