It is hard for a man who lives in town all the time to realize just how fast it is growing, but if he will keep notice on the new buildings as they go up he cannot help but realize that something is doing. Last summer concrete sidewalk work was fairly started, but not sufficient to begin enforcing the law to fill in the gaps. This work will be revived this spring, and by fall concrete walks will extend to every part of the city, and this, with electric lights, will make our city a pleasant place to live.
