In the Circuit Court of said county, February term, 1913, Friday, the 11th day of the term, and the 28th day of February, 1913.

The State of Missouri, at the relation and to the use of Chas. R. Pierce, Collector of the Revenue within and for the County of Pemisecot and State of Missouri, plaintiff,

Wm. Mitchell, Wm. A. Culbertson, Wm. Riley, defendants.

At this day comes the plaintiff herein by his attorney, before the Judge of the Circuit Court and shows to the satisfaction of the Court that he is unable to have the within named defendants served with the ordinary process of law.

Whereupon it is ordered by the Court that said defendants be notified by publication of section number eighteen (18), in township number twenty (20), north range fourteen (14) east, all as shown by the certified tax bill filed with said petition and made part thereof, and to obtain judgment against said land foreclosing said lien, and for said taxes, interest, fees and costs as aforesaid and obtain a special execution and order of sale for said lands for the payment of said taxes, collector's fees, attorney's fees, clerk's fees, interest, penalty and the costs accruing in this suit. And that unless the said Wm. Mitchell, Wm. A. Culbertson and Wm. Riley be and appear at this court at the next term thereof, to be begun and holden at the courthouse in the City of Caruthersville in said county, on the 21st day of July next, and on or before the third day of said term, unless further time be granted by the court, answer or demur to the petition in said cause, the same will be taken as confessed and judgment will be rendered accordingly. And it is further ordered that a copy hereof be published in the Hayti Herald, a newspaper published in said County of Pemisecot, for four weeks successively, published at least once a week, the last insertion to be at least fifteen days before the first day of said next July term of this court.
