**I. KOHN.**

It is pretty generally known that I. Kohn, who is engaged in business in this city, has been one of the active spirits against the Hayti Herald in the efforts that have been put forth to injure the paper, with the ultimate intention of putting it out of "peeness" and driving it out of Hayti. Kohn is a Russian and came over to this country several years ago to enjoy the liberty and the privileges bought with the blood of our ancestors—he came to escape the tyrannical yoke of Russia, to breathe free air and to live under a free flag, and he was welcomed. Arriving here, he was started out to peddle, carrying a pack on his back, and later on, having learned to speak English and learned the ways of American people, he came to Hayti to engage in business. He was welcomed here by some, but mistreated and insulted by others, but we were his friend, felt sorry for him, and favored him in many ways he never knew. After a lapse of several years his family came over from Russia to enjoy the blessings of a free country and his children to share the educational advantages of American schools, and all along we were a friend to him and a friend to his family. Later on he became naturalized as an American citizen, and again we were a friend to him, and boosted him for city office, school director, etc.

Two or three years ago, however, the Allens, who have always had an influence over Kohn, began to backbite and tattle to him, in an effort to turn him against us. We noticed his coldness towards us, but he refused to tell its cause. We finally located the trouble, however, and did not mince words in expressing our opinion to the Allen who had been the cause of it. But it seems he leaned with the Allens and yielded to them. I afterwards went to Kohn's store many times to buy goods, but met with cold treatment, and my immediate family also experienced the same treatment. We overlooked this, however, and managed to get along until the Snyder-Duvall shooting took place, and because we published the facts and the truth in that affair, the entire Allen family upheaved against us, and this was the fountain head and the beginning of all this fight and turmoil. Kohn followed off after the Allen gang. At first, the Allens, intoxicated

with egoism and feeling that they could run the entire town, thought they could run us out of town, and the fight waxed warm. After backbiting, tattling, lying, legal processes, bluffs, threats, boycotts, slugging, assaults, and every cussed, wicked and damnable scheme that a depraved and evil mind could possibly conjure up had failed to swerve the Herald, then the scheme was hatched to put a paper in against the Herald and by that means drive it out, but this required money, a thing entirely foreign to the Allens, so an appeal was made to Kohn, who, with Barkovitz of Portageville, another foreigner, started in to finance the scheme, which failed. Then some of the "peeness men," whose names have never been published, were appealed to, only to fail again. At this juncture an appeal was made to C. J. McElhenry, a stranger in our town, and the \$700.00 to import the new paper here to kill the Herald was raised, all in the name of McElhenry, but we have it upon good authority that Kohn put up not less than \$200.00 of the \$700.00. The new paper came, but only disgusted the people and proved a miserable failure. Seeing that the new paper and all efforts to kill the Herald burst like bubbles, Kohn began to talk to our friends to get us to "let up" on him, which we did, and again began boosting him. But Kohn's Russian blood had to come out and it developed that he was only deceiving.

The above is a long story, but it brings us to the facts so that the public will have an intelligent understanding of what we are going to say and see Mr. Kohn in his true light:

A few days ago we received a letter from the Otto J. Koch Advertising Agency, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, asking our advertising rates, and stating that they had an advertising contract to place for a clothing concern. They did not tell us who the clothing concern was or who the local dealer would be, nor did we ask or care—we are not that narrow, small and contentious. Upon receipt of our advertising rates the advertising agency sent us a signed contract to run the Adler & Sons Clothing Company (Milwaukee, Wisconsin) advertising in the Herald in March, April and May, with I. Kohn's name as local dealer. Immediately upon the insertion of the advertisement last week Kohn wrote the house to cancel the advertising contract with us and to not let us carry out the signed contract. Of course Kohn wants his Socialist to have the work.

Now, people, this is Mr. Kohn. Take a good look at him.

Be it understood that we neither ask or expect anything from Kohn—we care absolutely nothing about him. But he has busied himself to put us out of business, and, being a free-born American citizen, we do not propose for any foreigner to come over here and meddle with our affairs, and now that this man has thrown the gauntlet, he will simply have to suffer the consequences. The advertising in question was not to cost Kohn one penny, but was to be paid for by the house, and but for his gripe, envy and spite, he would have received a great benefit, for the Herald's hundreds of friends would have thought that our old and pleasant relation of friendship had been renewed. Now they know different, and they know why.

**WABBLING SOME.**

The Socialist is reputed to have said that it is having a hard time, that it has a fine printing outfit laying idle, that the politicians and candidates, from whom it is expecting its biggest graft, are ignoring it and turning it down.
