The people named below have enrolled in the acre yield corn contest, conducted by the Agricultural Department of the State Normal School, Cape Girardeau. The cash prizes and scholarships distributed by the State Normal School will be limited to these people and those who enroll before June 1, as all entries close on that date.

What are the possibilities of our soil when the best seed is used, when we prepare the seed bed in the best possible manner, and make a liberal use of barnyard manure? In 1913 we set 100 bushels per acre as a standard, and the contest was won on a 99 bushel yield. This year we have set 150 bushels per acre. How many in this county can go above the 100 bushel mark? Hayti Sixteen Years Ago.

(Friday, May 6, 1895.)

Before the county court, last Tuesday morning, a petition bobbed up with about 900 names petitioning the court to order an election for the removal of the county seat from Gayoso to Caruthersville. The work in getting up the petition was carried on very quietly and rapidly, being done in one evening and night, and no one but the parties interested knew anything about it until it was presented to the court. The order was, of course, granted. (No comment, except that this was the first step in what has proven the most bitter page in the history of Pemiscot county, and the end is not yet.)

Pemiscot Co. Farm Boy Fund.

The fund raised in Pemiscot County to send a boy to the State Agriculture College is now in the hands of the County Treasurer, Mr. John Cunningham, County Supt. Chas. Ross and Supt. R. M. Hogan of Caruthersville have been chosen to administer the fund.

These conditions have been formulated. The fund will be used to keep a student in the two year Winter Course which begins November 1 and lasts till March 1 annually. Persons 16 years of age or older who have completed the first 8 grades of school will be eligible.

In this way a boy from the farm may go to school for the winter and still help on the farm during the busiest months. Moreover the committee believes that this class of boys will more likely give back to the county the benefit of their schooling.

The following things will be considered in determining the representative of this county: financial condition, moral standing and natural ability as well as mental worth as determined by an examination to be conducted by the committee.
