## MRS. GWIN DEAD.

A pall was cast over this city Easter Sunday afternoon when it was learned that Mrs. Mary (Alma) P. Gwin, wife of F. M. Gwin, had passed in the great beyond. Death occurred at 2:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Gwin had only been confined to her bed a short time, but for years had suffered bad health.

She was a daughter of the late Granville M. Hayes, the founder of Hayti, and was born April 6, 1858, at the once county seat, Gayoso. March 11, in the year 1877, she was married to Frank M. Gwin, a native of Indiana, who came to this county in 1872. To this union five boys were born, they being: dead, Granville and Claude; living, Winnie, Clyde and Jesse.

Mrs. Gwin had always been an active church worker, and remained so until her death, having joined the Baptist church in 1886. She also belonged to the W. C. T. U., and was one of its most able members. She led a pure, Christian life.

At the time of her death every member of her immediate family was present, and life passed with one sweet smile.
