"THE GREAT WHITE WAY."

Hayti, Mo., June 26, 1916. Editor Herald: I noticed your article in the last issue of the Herald relative to the day electric current for this city, which I think was timely and well stated, and being one of the interested users of electricity, I wish to add my voice to what you have said, and as yourself, not by way of a "kick," but it is our constitutional right to petition, and we get very little in this world we do not ask for.

I am sure if this city should be furnished the all-day current the light company would find it profitable, as few people are going to buy fans, irons, motors, etc., until they see the power to use them. If the company is waiting for this it is making a sad mistake. On the other hand, I do not know of the company soliciting any increased business, or taking steps to see if enough fans, irons, motors, etc., might be installed to justify a day current. This looks bad on the part of the company, and seems to indicate that they have some other object in view.

The citizens of Hayti need and want a day current, but since it is not offered them, they do not know what to do. I would suggest to them the liberal use of the columns of the Hayti Herald.

Now, as to the connection with the Caruthersville plant, no one who knows the facts and wants to see our city have a good service, can object to this. It is the service we should want, no matter where it is generated, and it may be only a short while until all the towns of this section are supplied from one central plant, and that plant may be at Hayti; and all our cities may be connected by street car lines.

But there is another thing: If Hayti and Caruthersville are connected by electricity, why not all the good farmers along the line be furnished with electricity for lighting and power, and the public road between the two cities be lighted as a street--then we would have our "great white way." But here is the rub, as I understand it--THE USE OF THE PUBLIC ROAD. I have been informed that the county court did at first agree to grant the company a franchise along the public road, but later, on the complaint of "certain" citizens, withdrew their consent, unless certain considerations were agreed to, one of them being that the court house and jail be furnished with free electricity. This was a fatal blunder, and one the county court should be quick to undo, for in denying the electric wires to be run along the public road it is throwing an impediment in the way of the future progress of Pemiscot county, and working an almost unbearable hardship upon the city of Hayti in particular. The wire could do the road no possible harm, but might be of great service. To say the least, it would be the first step to that day which is coming here as it has come in other countries, when electric power and lights will be general, and car lines and cheap fare will save the people much time and money.
