

CIRCUIT COURT HAS AN ADJOURNED TERM

Judges McCarty and Kelly on the Bench--Levee District Suits Up for Decision.

An adjourned term of circuit court convened here Monday, February 26, with Judge McCarty and the other regular officials present.

In criminal cases: Henry Hill, carrying pistol, plea of guilty, fine of \$100 and paid in open court. Charles Morgan, on parole, finally discharged.

In civil cases: Adelia White et al. vs. Raymond Daugherty et al., partition court finds interests of parties as set out in petition.

F. L. Ferguson vs. F. E. Austin, damages, dismissed.

W. F. Harper vs. Frisco, damages submitted to the court, who awarded plaintiff \$750 actual and \$250 punitive damages.

Joe B. Latschaw vs. L. S. Chancellor, to determine interest, judgment for defendant.

Arthur Robertson vs. Louie DeLisle et al., and Arthur Robertson vs. H. S. Newton et al., to quiet title, both dismissed for failure to file cost bond.

Missouri Training School for Boys vs. Pemiscot County, motion for new trial overruled.

Nellie Keys vs. Lee Dooley et al., appeal from justice, motion to affirm judgment of justice overruled.

Sarah Kyle vs. Kimmel O'Wynne, to correct deed, court finds for defendant.
