COUNTY SEAT HIGHWAY TO BE OPENED

Highway Will Connect Both Kennett and Caruthersville--Pass Directly Through Hayti.

At the regular meeting of the County Court held on the first Monday of each month much interesting business was brought up, several school loans made and several accounts allowed. A report was received from the road commission appointed to assess damages for the right-of-way for the road recently petitioned for by the Wisconsin Lumber Co., which is composed of F. M. Gwin and W. H. Foley. This is the road which is to run west through Hayti from Caruthersville and connect with the road to be established by Dunklin county from Kennett to this place. It is in large part already surveyed and established and for the strictly new portion of the road the commission reported no damage asked by those who already had granted right-of-way and a prospect that none would be asked. Right-of-way is yet to be secured from C. M. Porter, H. A. Forster and W. R. Pennell, which will be done by the time the commission can make its next report, which under the will law not be before the regular May term.

Two justices of the peace resigned at this term of court--C. R. Morgan and F. M. Stoppel, of Pemiscot and Little River townships, respectively. G. O. Strome and Walter Shepard were the appointees to succeed them. C. H. and J. A. May were granted swamp land patents on 87 acres in 19-18-12 and 17 acres in 30-16-12; David H. Culp on 40 acres in 24-18-11; and J. R. Clayton and J. H. Hillin on 80 acres in 25-20-11.

School fund loans granted to J. R. Clayton and J. H. Hillin in the sum of \$3,000 and to George Duncan, an additional \$500, making \$1400 in all to him, all such loans fully secured by real estate liens.

Ordered by the Court that all county officers prepare and file with the Court on March 1st a list of all supplies needed for three months in advance. Any supplies ordered outside of such lists will be on the personal responsibility of the person making said order.

W. M. Collins and J. H. Jones were appointed overseers of Drainage District Nos. 6 and 8,

respectively.

County Engineer L. E. Thrupp ordered to survey one-half mile of ditch along the Elmer Hazel farm near Netherlands, the county to pay one-half the cost of excavation at 18 cents per cubic foot, Mr. Hazel to pay the other half and to see that the dirt is removed from the ditch and properly placed on the road there.
