Intern St. Louis Germans.

ST. LOUIS, MO., March 23.—Germans in St. Louis will be placed in detention camps in case of war with Germany, according to a statement made today by United States District Attorney Oliver, in charge of the Department of Justice arrangements in this territory. This is the first definite official announcement in the country of intention to intern Germans in case of war.

Oliver said that in the event of any demonstration in this city the leaders would be immediately arrested.

"We have the names of a great many Germans who are showing too much German sentiment," he declared. All those known to have pro-German sentiment will be placed in jail in case of a demonstration, while others who are known to be in sympathy with the leaders whom we are watching will be placed in detention camps in case of war with Germany."

Agents of the Department of Justice, in addition to the large number employed in guarding plants and bridges here, have been used for the past 10 days to watch certain Germans. The officials will not permit any names to be made public. Fear of being interned in case of war has caused many German-Americans of this district to flee to Mexico, more than 2,000 having left since the break in relations.

Only a Mote to Taxpayers.

A bond issue for the purpose of building a court house would not increase the tax of the average individual in the county to an extent that would be more than barely noticeable. The county certainly stands in need of such a building. Why not construct one and place Pemiscot county somewhere in the neighborhood of a level with other counties of the state?—Caruthersville Democrat.

We may be wrong, but it looks to us, with the county in debt as it is, and with taxation almost unbearable, that it requires an estimable gall to ask the people of the county to further tax themselves at this time to build a Hundred Thousand Dollar Courthouse for Caruthersville. Some leading taxpayers we have heard speak of it, say it is nothing more nor less than an insult to the intelligence of the people of the county. Such a proposition, on a square vote, they say, would, and should be, defeated 90 to 1. Another makes the remark that Caruthersville has stolen everything she has gone after of this nature, and only expects to get a new courthouse by the same methods. The evident impossibility of winning such a proposition by a square deal, may lend color to the latter suspicion. To say the least of it, whatever the idea is, it is more than the people of the county can fathom; but of one thing we are sure, the people are not in the right humor to stand more of the same sort of trickery that has been going on with such high-handed boldness in this county for a number of years.
