NO BEER AFTER DECEMBER 1

All brewing operations in the country will cease December 1 until further orders and no further unmalted grains may be purchased for brewing purposes from that date, according to the telegram to F. B. Mumford, federal food administrator for Missouri, from Herbert Hoover. Manufacturers of all beverages and mineral waters also have been warned that there will be further curtailment in fuel for the manufacture of glass containers, of tin plates for caps, of transportation and of food products in such beverages. The telegram follows:

"On July 3, brewers were notified by the Fuel Administration that their coal consumption would be reduced 50 per cent pending the period of exhaustion of materials that they had in process and were given preliminary warning that they might not be able to continue their operations at all after such exhaustion.

"At that time the Food Administration directed the cessation of further purchases of raw materials for malting. After a conference between the President and representatives of the Fuel, Food and Railroad Administrations and the War Industries Board, it has been determined that the further necessity of war industries for the whole fuel productive capacity of the country, the considerably drought which has materially affected the supply of feeding stuff for next year, the strain upon transportation to handle necessary industries, the shortage of labor caused by the enlargement of the Army operations, renders it necessary that brewing operations of all kinds should cease upon December 1 until further orders and that no further unmalted grains be purchased for brewing purposes from this date."

IMPROVING A TOWN

There are more ways than just a few to improve the towns of this county. Great success depends upon the way the city or town is kept and the interest the people of that town take to make it a good one. There is absolutely no use of having modern improvements unless the people have a desire to make the most of them.

Some towns in this part of the state have just such a record. They have weeds growing all over the entire town, people too lazy to cut them and not caring how tall the weeds grow. Then these kinds of towns go down. They soon retrograde to the smallest and dullest village, and becomes so bad that none desires to live in them.

AMERICA'S FRONT IS FROM NO MAN'S LAND TO PACIFIC

DEPTH OF OUR FORCES DESCRIBED BY AMERICAN OFFICER TO BRITISH COMRADE.

BACKING LINE WITH BONDS

Support of Battle Forces Extends From France to Your Own Doorway.

It was just after the American troops had taken over their first sector on the Western front one day last fall, an English officer was talking with an American captain who had just come back from a tour of duty in the trenches. They were talking military problems and the Englishman asked:

"What is the depth of the American front?"

"From the German barbed wire in No Man's Land to the Pacific Coast," was the American officer's answer.

Of course, the Englishman referred to a military technicality when he asked his question, and yet the American captain was right. He told the whole story of American participation in the war when he made it plain that all of America is in the battle front. America had not been in this war six months till we all understood it was a different sort of a war from what we had expected. Years ago we all pictured war as a struggle in which a few from each community went away, while the great majority of the people stayed on at home and went about their business and life went along undisturbed. We know better now. We realize we are all in the struggle.

All Are Enlisted.

Those who cannot fight, who cannot work in war plants, who cannot help in Y. M. C. A. huts or Red Cross hospitals can help nevertheless. The Liberty Loans offer an opportunity for every man and woman in America, for every American under the protecting shadow of the Stars and Stripes to help support the battle front of America far across the seas in Europe.

NATIONAL PROHIBITION IS PRACTICALLY PASSED

The House of Representatives Monday approved the bill recently passed by the Senate for national prohibition for the duration of the war, the measure taking effect next July 1st. The bill now goes to conference. The bill also stops the importation of wine to take effect with the President's signature. So we are to have prohibition as a war measure, and probably for all time, as it is doubted by many that once in effect the law can ever be overcome, as the prohibitionists will have the advantage.

THIS YEAR'S WHEAT PRICE SAME AS LAST YEAR

The President has this year set the price of wheat to be the same as it was last year. He has the power to do so from Congress. In St. Louis wheat will be sold at \$2.24 per bushel, and in Kansas City it will be sold for \$2.18 per bushel.
