INSTITUTE HELD AT ST. LOUIS

For Training of Executive Secretaries of Red Cross—Twelve-Weeks' Course Will Be Given

According to information just received from Southwestern divisional headquarters of the Red Cross at St. Louis, Red Cross chapters in Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas are to have an organized Executive Secretaries by sending students to Service Institutes one of which will be opened soon at St. Louis, Missouri. A twelve-weeks' course of training will be given, the last four weeks of which will be spent in actual field work under conditions similar to those encountered in the work of an Executive Secretary.

The Service Institute to be conducted at St. Louis will begin September 20 and will last until December 11. St. Louis institutions will be used as the basis for the work of the Institute. The course will consist of both theoretical and practical work, and after the last four weeks at the Institute is completed, the students will return to the local Red Cross chapters which sent them to the Institute, and there they will assume the duties of Executive Secretaries, for which their special training has fitted them. The subjects to be studied have to do with the peace time work of local Red Cross chapters, the work being planned to treat in a practical way the problems of chapter organization and management, rural work, child welfare, public health and kindred subjects.

Over 100 students have received training at the ten Red Cross Service Institutes which have been conducted in the past year. The expenses of 70 of these were paid by local chapters and of this number 69 were returned to positions as Executive Secretaries.

Students who attend the Service Institute at St. Louis will come from Missouri, Kansas and Arkansas, while a second Institute for students from Texas will be conducted at the University of Texas at Austin, Texas, between the dates of September 27 and December 18. Plans are being made for a third Institute to be conducted later at the University of Oklahoma for students from Oklahoma, but the date has not been definitely announced.

FARMERS' GIN COMPLETED

The Farmers' Gin Company of New Madrid has practically completed the building of their new gin. The ginning machinery is arriving and will be installed in time for the first cotton.

This is the first Farmers' Co-operative Gin to be organized in the State and the Company now consists of seventy-eight shareholders. —New Madrid County Farm Bureau News.

MISSOURI WEEKLY INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Jefferson City, Aug. 11.—Following facts in regard to Missouri as a farming state are declared by state board of agriculture to be shown by an accurate survey of the state and comparison with other farming states.

Missouri is first: in poultry. In diversified farming. In number of crops and fruits.

Missouri has both the first and second largest horse and mule markets in the world.

Missouri is the home of more fine Shorthorn and Hereford pure-bred cattle than any other state in the union.

Missouri has 1,040,000 horses, 378,000 mules, 919,000 milk cows, 1,746,000 other cattle, 1,525,000 sheep, 4,305,000 hogs and 33,178,000 poultry in 1920.

Marysville—\$60,000 appropriated by Congress to be applied on public highways in Nodaway county this year.

King City—New Trust Co. capitalized at \$50,000 to be opened here. Carthage—Boilers and other heating apparatus for new 100-room hotel arrive.

Kansas City—Gregory-Craun Motor Co. capitalized at \$1,500,000 to establish plant here.

Thru the united action of the Farm Bureaus of S. E. Missouri the S. E. Missouri Melon Growers' Association was organized last month. Practically all of the melon growers in that section of the state belong to the association.

A trade-mark has been adopted and stickers bearing this trade-mark will be pasted on all cars of melons averaging 24 pounds or more. According to the New Madrid County Farm Bureau News, "It is expected that the organization will be able by grading and marketing the crop co-operatively to secure from \$25 to \$50 more per car."
