MISSOURI BOOSTS FRUIT

Jefferson City, Mo., Aug. 12—Governor Frederick D. Gardner has appointed an entire new Board of Control for the Missouri State Fruit Experiment Station located at Mountain Grove as follows: Paul Evans of West Plains, Howell county; Dr. E. L. Beal, Republic, Green county; W. F. Flournoy, Marlonville, Lawrence county.

This Fruit Board will co-operate with the State Horticultural Society and State Board of Agriculture in developing Governor Gardner's vigorous ambition to foster larger plantings and better methods of orcharding. This Board is one of the strongest and ablest that could be selected in the state, and has been chosen from the Ozark country at points easily accessible to the Fruit Station, which is one of the largest experimental orchards in the Central West, covering 180 acres and growing the largest number of varieties of apples of any orchard in the world.
