HOME OWNING VS. DIVORCES

The contention that home owning makes for good citizenship and higher living ideals is corroborated by a recent study of divorce cases in Chicago, where out of 3577 suits for divorce filed in a recent year only 70 couples owned their homes. In 2,171 cases there were no children.

Records show that in Chicago in 1919 there were 37,583 marriages and between 5,000 and 6,000 divorces, an increase in divorces of 20 per cent since 1911. The growth of the apartment habit and extravagance are given as two prominent causes for this increase.

The thought that anything will again be normal is a great illusion. Prices will fluctuate of course but a general decline in prices is groundless.



BEST USE OF ROUGHAGE BY FENCING FIELD

Feed is always scarce on the majority of the farms in the Cotton Belt. For this and other reasons peanut vines, sorghum heads, cane tops, oat straw, sweet potato vines, green grass, cotton and corn stalks, etc. should either be grazed or saved and housed for feed. Gather the corn just as soon as it matures unless velvet beans or some late maturing variety of cowpeas are growing in it, and turn in all livestock so that they may be fat before the first killing frost. Pick out the cotton as fast as it opens, as the leaves, immature bolls and stalks are valuable as a feed, before frost. It is usually possible, especially in the Lower South, to pick out the cotton and turn the cattle in to eat out the cotton fields before frost. There is no real reason why the corn and cotton stalks and the grass should become practically worthless before the corn is harvested and the cotton picked out and livestock turned into the fields.

The great big reason why livestock are not turned into the fields until all crops are harvested and killing frosts have practically ruined the larger part of the forage for grazing purposes, is lack of fencing. Let us divide out cultivated land into several fields and plant one crop in each field or plant two or more crops that mature at the same time in each field so that livestock may be turned in just as soon as the crop or crops are harvested. The value of the grazing will often pay for the cross fencing in one season.
