### THE LAST VOYAGE

Mrs. Artie Hayes died Thursday, March 9, 1922, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ada Brooks, of Oklahoma City, Okla., aged 64 years, one month and 27 days.

The body was brought to Hayti for burial, being accompanied by her daughter, Mrs. Brooks and husband, and son, Hough, who also lives in that city.

The remains of the deceased arrived here Friday night and were carried to the home of Mrs. Darxie Hayes, a sister-in-law, to await the funeral which was held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, at the Baptist church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. W. C. Scott. The white casket was almost hidden by a bank of floral offerings, the immortelles of deserved affection of numerous friends. The large edifice was filled until standing room was hardly left, and after the short appropriate eulogy of the pastor the choir sang:

"Somewhere the sun is shining,  
Somewhere the song birds dwell."

There were few dry eyes in the congregation when the sympathetic singers ceased the softened notes of life's sweetest melody; but

"Hush thy sad repining,  
God lives and all is well."

After services at the church, the remains were transferred to the Hayes Cemetery, followed by a long line of mourning friends and relatives, and there interment was made in the once-playground of childhood days where "the sun shone and the song birds dwell." It serves another purpose now—a bed for the family, dead, where, one by one, from far and near, they journey back to their old home to rest in life's last, long sleep.

Mrs. Artie Hayes was the wife of Hough Hayes, who died about twenty years ago, and by whose side she awaits the call of the resurrection.

Before marriage she was Miss Artie Smitherman, and while born in West Virginia January 9, 1858, she came to Pemiscot county when a mere tot of a girl. She grew up here in the days of pioneer hardship, and married Hough Hayes, son of Dr. G. M. Hayes, founder of Hayti. To that union were born four children—Pearl, Lena, Hough and Ada. All survive but Lena, who married Charles Graham and died in Parsons, Kansas a few years ago, whose body was also brought here for burial at the time of her death. Pearl, (Mrs. Gaskin) lives at Parsons, Kansas, and came direct here to attend her mother's funeral.

Mrs. Hayes had only been with her daughter in Oklahoma City a short while before she died, having gone there from Parsons, Kansas, where she has resided with her daughter Pearl.

Besides numerous friends, several grand-children, and other relatives, Mrs. Hayes is also survived by one brother, William Smitherman.

Mrs. Hayes was a charter member of the Baptist church here, to which she retained her membership, living at all times a consistent and exemplary christian life. She was a friend to the needy, the sick, the suffering and the sorrowful, as many here know who have felt the kindly touch of her helping hand.

But those kind hands are forever stilled. "Leaves have their time to fall, and the flower to wither at the north wind's breath, the stars to set; but Thou claimest all seasons, O Death." Whether it comes in the morning of life, when all the dreams are painted rose hue or at noon-tide when we pause to rest, the journey half over, weary, yet contented, we look backward and then, onward, for the road of "understanding" broadens there; or if it comes when evening shadows fall, and all weary we shall stop to rest. God in His mercy ruleth over all. He knoweth and doeth all things best. It was past the noonday mileage stone when this good lady paused, weary, on the way, for the burden of "affliction" was too much for her to carry further, and the great heart of the Heavenly Father was touched by the uncomplaining child, and He whispered: "It is enough. Come home."

Her name will ever be held in fondness, and will always recall a life well lived, a life of work well done, and a memory of rich legacy. She goes where the "sun is shining where the song birds dwell;" to join the band of the immortal geniuses who bloom and reopen in another sphere.
