THE "MAJESTIC," WORLD'S LARGEST OCEAN LINER.

Allocated by the treaty of Versailles to the British government, and sold by it to the White Star Line the former German steamship "Bismarck" has been converted into the liner "Majestic," very suitably named, for it is the world's largest ship and in many ways the most luxuriously fitted vessel afloat, says Henry S. White, in an illustrated article in the July Popular Mechanics Magazine. This ocean-borne palace is 956 feet long, 100 feet broad; its hull is 102 feet deep, and its tonnage is 56,000. It has nine decks, with a total area of 7 1/2 acres, and its main deck is 75 feet above water. It has accommodations for 4,100 passengers and a crew of 1,000.

Besides the luxuriously furnished first-class accommodations, the ship has second and third-class quarters which correspond in character with the other parts of the ship.

J. A. BIGHAM DEAD.

John Albert Bigham died Sunday morning at 7:55 o'clock, at his home in this city, of typhoid fever and accompanying complication, after an illness of two weeks, at the age of 42 years, nine months and one day. The deceased was born in 1879 at Gayoso, the then county seat of Pemiscol county, his parents being John M. and Mary Bigham. His father held various offices of this county, including that of sheriff, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. John Albert Bigham was elected treasurer of this county in 1908 and re-elected in 1912, but resigned on account of failing health. He was at one time in the furniture business in this city, and since resigning from the treasurer's office has been engaged in the cotton and feed business and looking after his farming interests. He was married to Miss Clara Latsch in January, 1904, she surviving him. In addition to his widow, deceased is survived by a daughter, Augusta, two brothers, Carl and Edgar, living near Braggadocio, one sister, Mrs. L. N. Swinney, of Oklahoma City, a half-sister, Mrs. Carl Webb of Braggadocio. He was a member of the Elks fraternity.

Funeral services were conducted at the family residence Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. Elmer Peal and the Rev. H. V. McCulloch, after which interment was had in Little Prairie cemetery.—Democrat-Argus.


