TREASURY DEFICIT NOW \$700,000,000.00

About the only thing growing larger under the present Republican administration is the Treasury deficit. Beginning as a mere matter of \$21,000,000 the deficit has risen rapidly to \$700,000,000, with the prospect for a further enlargement to ten figures very bright.

It hasn't been so long since Republicans promised that their accession to control of the government would automatically increase revenues, reduce debts and enhance prosperity. The record for August—the seventeenth month of the Harding administration's career—shows how badly the Republicans fooled the public.

There was an increase of \$85,000,000 in the public debt in August compared with the previous month. It was due in large part to the sale of Treasury securities, borrowing money to meet current expenses so that an impression of "economy" could be given.

Along with the increase in the public debt there was a decline in receipts. The ordinary receipts last month were \$25,000,000 less than in August, 1921. Public debt expenses were \$215,000,000 greater in August this year than in August last year. Income tax receipts were \$23,000,000 less in August, 1922, than in the same month of 1921. Miscellaneous internal revenue receipts for last month were \$12,000,000 less than in August, 1921.

THE "MISSISSIPPI" WAKES UP

If Mark Twain were to come back on the Mississippi these days he mightn't notice so much diminution in traffic as the coming of the rail roads originally brought about. Instead, the old "Mississipp" is coming again into its own as a bearer of goods and wares bound for the ocean-going ships that put in at New Orleans. Barges are carrying more than they have carried since the old days when steamboat races plowed boiling waters on the river's surface and little darky boys sat on the safety valves so the steam would send the maximum of power to the old paddle wheels.

Private craft are taking a hand in the freighting game and river towns are coming to life again. Nails in kegs came on the waters from Pittsburgh and coffee goes up the river to St. Louis. Cotton for export comes with the current of the river to New Orleans, and burlap from India stems the flow of the Father of Waters on the way back to inland places.

The cause of this awakening in traffic isn't given in the accounts of it, but doubtless it is a combination of the congestion due to the strike on the railroads and of the retarding effect of high freight rates for the overland haul. The actual cost of river traffic always was cheaper than the rail freight cost, but we got in such a hurry for our shipments in this country that we used to think we could not wait for the river craft to waddle downstream with it. Changing conditions are about to convince at least those situated on the river that the old way can still be used to advantage.—Dallas Morning News.
