
A CELEBRATION.

Project 173A, Pemiscot County. MISSOURI STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Sealed proposals, addressed to the County Clerk, Caruthersville, Missouri, and endorsed "Proposal for constructing (or improving) State Road, Project 173A," will be received by the State Highway Commission until 2:00 o'clock P. M., on the 13th day of October, 1922 and at that time will be publicly opened and read at the County Court House.

The proposed work includes grading, constructing culverts, bridges, and a gravel pavement 16 feet wide, together with any incidental work on the State Road from Hayti, northwardly, the total length of the improvement being 3.080 miles.

Plans and specifications are on file and may be inspected in the office of the County Clerk, in the office of Division Engineer, F. B. Newton, Sikeston, Mo., or at the offices of the State Highway Commission, Jefferson City, Mo.

A set of plans and specifications may be obtained from Mr. Newton upon deposit of ten dollars (\$10.00), which amount will be refunded if both plans and specifications are returned in good condition within ten days after date of the letting.

Proposals shall be submitted upon blank forms provided for the purpose by Mr. Newton, and shall be accompanied by a certified check made payable to the Treasurer of the State of Missouri, for five (5) per cent of the amount of the bid. A proposal bond cannot be accepted in lieu of a certified check, and a bid when accompanied by a proposal bond will be automatically rejected.

Payments will be made on monthly estimates but should not be expected prior to the last of the month for the estimate of the preceding month.

The right is reserved by the State Highway Commission to reject any or all bids.
