—An old poultry raiser says that fowls dry-picked bring better prices than when scalded. Greater skill is required to dry-pick poultry than most people imagine, in order that the "bird" may look plump and handsome. To do this work properly or with any degree of satisfaction the fowl should be plucked when warm—that is, immediately after it is killed—as if allowed to get cold before stripping the feathers you are very apt to tear the flesh.

—You may lawfully shoot deer from October 1 to January 1; turkeys, September 15 to March 1; prairie chickens (pin-nated grouse), August 15 to February 1; ruffed grouse (commonly called pheasants) and quail (Virginia partridges), October 1 to January 1; woodcock, July 1 to January 10; doves, plover and meadow lark, August 1 to February 1; waterfowl, not protected. All insectivorous birds, their nests and eggs and those of game birds are protected.

—Some time ago an Illinois editor tested the virtue of the Postal law making it larceny to take a paper and not pay for it. He obtained judgement against each for the full amount of his claim. About half of them then came up and made oath that they had no more property than the law allowed them as exempt from execution. He had this lot arrested and sent to jail for larceny. He was a plucky editor, and it is safe to say he will be paid in the future.
