WHAT LONDON PAPERS SAY.

Superior in His Home Life, But a Bâton to Society.
LONDON, Dec. 5.—In commenting on the death of Jay Gould, the News says: "It was Mr. Gould's ambition to be the richest man in the world, but he died disappointed. The Vanderbilts, Astors and Rockefellers head him. Yet all honor to the greatest money-maker of any age or clime. He was less a man than a machine for churning wealth. Napoleon's combinations were never vaster, and there were many points of resemblance between the two men. It will be impossible to explain one phase of civilization without a frequent mention of Gould's name, therefore he is sure of a place in history."

The Chronicle, in recounting the career of the man whom Gould is said to have ruined, calls him the pest of society, a dynamite of finance, a man possessing a power that the czars might envy, with the ethics of the alligator.

The Times says: "Mr. Gould's death means the removal of a disturbing influence of vast and incalculable force. The man and the position he held were products of American life. Such a career could have scarcely been possible elsewhere than in America. Money is raised in America to a rank higher than it can usefully occupy, owing to the absence of class distinctions."

The Times, in a long obituary article on Mr. Gould, says he was one of the most remarkable men of the last half of the century. No other man, unaided by family influence, friends or luck has written himself so deeply into the financial history of the republic. No other man exercised such a baneful influence on the moral character of the community. Yet the side which he kept hidden from the world was in many ways in striking contrast. He was never accused of ostentation, and all acquainted with his home life have but one opinion to express—that it was a very kingly one.

GOTHAM OPINIONS OF GOULD.

Sage, Depew, and Others Speak of the Dead Railway King.

New York, Dec. 5.—"Every one must realize," said Russell Sage yesterday, "that in Jay Gould's death the country has sustained a loss which is irreparable. He was universally acknowledged to be one of the leading minds of the age. No one has done so much as he in the development of the resources of this country, and the splendid railways constructed and maintained by him will ever be regarded as monuments to his genius and energy."

Dr. Chauncey M. Depew said: "Mr. Gould's death will have little or no effect on the stock markets. He was too sharp a business man to make any mistake about the future. He told me eight weeks ago that his affairs were all adjusted, and that, should he drop dead at any time, his business was so arranged that his sons could take charge of his interest at once."

Henry Clews said: "Jay Gould has undoubtedly been one of the wonders of the world. Abnormally great among men of affairs, he had many good qualities. He was generous to a fault and was invariably true to his friends, but bitter and unforgiving to his enemies. Much of the spread of the railroad transportation is due to his remarkable enterprise, sagacity and organizing ability."

TRUSTED THE STOCKS.

Gould Placed "Them So They Could Not Be Sold."

New York, Dec. 5.—John T. Terry, who has been connected with Mr. Gould for years, and who is a director in a number of the Gould properties, says: "Mr. Gould said recently that he had 'trusted' (to use his own expression) the three stocks in which he was most interested, and that they could not be sold." The three stocks referred to are Manhattan, Western Union and Missouri Pacific. The general opinion on the street is that Mr. Gould has had his house in good order for a long time.

Interviews with prominent bankers and brokers are to the effect that the death of Mr. Gould will not have much influence on the market either way.

Millions of Letters Sent Abroad.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 5.—The annual report of Capt. N. M. Brooks, superintendent of foreign mails, shows that during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1892, there were dispatched by sea to foreign countries 5,198,415 pounds of mail matter, of which \$12,638 pounds were letters and postal cards. Of the letters and postal cards Great Britain received 38.54 per cent of the whole; Germany, 20.42 per cent; France, 6.7 per cent.

Made Fraudulent Pension Claims.

BAY CITY, Mich., Dec. 5.—Charles Trombley and William Torrence, gray-haired men were convicted in the United States court of making fraudulent claims for pensions, and were each sentenced to pay a fine of \$1,000. George Lake, a Saginaw counterfeiter, was sentenced to eighteen months' imprisonment.

Noted French Author Dangerously Ill.

PARIS, Dec. 5.—M. Hippolyte Adolph Taine, the well-known French author and member of the French Academy, is dangerously ill in this city.
