#### Brakeman Green Killed and Trains Delayed.

As an Iron Mountain freight was going north near Blackwell Sunday night about ten o'clock, it broke in two on a down grade just south of the station. As brakeman Green was setting a brake on the first car of the rear section, the parts of the train came together throwing him between the cars and killing him almost instantly. Some damage was done to the cars. Both north and south bound trains were delayed, the passenger going south on the Belmont branch being two hours and a half late at Lutesville.

### Of the Dead.

Mrs. Tom Allen died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Mathews in Cape Girardeau last Thursday morning, at a little less than 20 years of age. She was buried in the Christian cemetery at Fredericktown after funeral services by Rev. Wilkins. On August 7 last she was married to Tom Allen and lived in Springfield, Mo. until within a few weeks of her death.

With the soothing belief that she is a redeemed one in the great concourse about the Throne, let us draw the shroud of earthly mourning about those she left behind.

### The Academy Boarding Hall.

The board of directors of the Mayfield-Smith academy boarding hall association met in Marble Hill Tuesday. No permanent organization will be effected until the association is incorporated.

A committee on site, composed of Henry M. Smith, George E. Clark and W. A. Dunn, was appointed, with the request that the building be located on the college grounds. A committee on plans and specifications was appointed, composed of Joseph Graham of Fredericktown, E. H. Barber of Zion and Prof. E. R. Graham of Marble Hill.

The association has sold \$2,000 worth of stock and hope to sell \$1,000 more. A \$3,000 hall will be built if \$3,000 cannot be raised.
