A Judge a Seducer.

The case was appealed to the state supreme court. He was indicted by the Scott county grand jury in 1889 and the case was taken to Mississippi county on a change of venue, after a jury had disagreed in Scott county.

Miss Hawkins now lives in St. Louis. Her testimony is that Sibley who is her step-father outraged her when she was under 13 years of age in the presence and with the consent of her mother and that the illicit relations were continued for more than three years.

Sibley was once judge of the county court of Scott county.
