SOME MORE REPUBLICAN METHODS.

The republican state central committee had a meeting in St. Louis, one day last week, and it turned to one of those love feasts (?) they are certain to get up where the crowd is composed of "wines" and "meats." Postmasters, especially, were largely in evidence. Among other interesting matter that came before the meeting were the preambles and resolutions offered by W. H. Hallett of Nevada, which read as follows:

Whereas, The republican party has always stood, and now stands, not only for official honesty, but for official responsibility; and

Whereas, It appears that the national subtreasurer at St. Louis, Mo., has permitted a loss in funds handled by his office to the amount of about sixty-one thousand five hundred (\$61,500) dollars; and

Whereas, Bills have been introduced in both houses of our national congress for the purpose and to the end of relieving the said national subtreasurer and his bondsmen from payment of said sum; now therefore be it

Resolved, By the republican state committee for the state of Missouri that we condemn such attempt to avoid official responsibility and declare that we favor the payment of all loss to the federal government by the said national subtreasurer and his bondsmen.

Did it carry? Well, hardly. It did not even come near carrying. It lacked some honest republican votes. Some of the men who have made the biggest "error" about the honesty of the g. o. p.—it's careful handling of the money of the "dear people"—voted to knock the resolution higher than a kite.

Ben Russell, for instance, said "the adoption of the resolution would ruin the party in the state." Don't that jar you? Ruin the party for its officials and representatives to be honest with the people?

Answering Mr. Russell Joe McCoy said:

"We were going around the state asking to see the books at Jefferson City, which were in the care of the democrats, and when we did find them they were well kept; but to our surprise, while we were asking about the books in Jefferson City, this shortage of \$61,500 was discovered in the local subtreasury, and we went down in defeat. I think the resolution should prevail."

But when the vote was taken only sixteen of the thirty-six cast were in favor of the resolution. Bill Flentze of Cape Girardeau was one of the postmasters who voted it down.

When Mr. Flentze was going up and down over this state, two years ago, asking the people to elect him to the responsible position of railroad commissioner did he intimate that he was ready and anxious to vote against an "honesty" resolution and in favor of the taxpayers going down into their pockets and making up a loss of \$61,500 to protect a party who is under bond to secure the people against such loss. Mr. Flentze and the other nineteen members of the republican committee who voted down that resolution have done one thing—they have gone on record. The toiling masses of the republican party—who are not holding office or expecting to do so—are honest, and they believe in honest officials. These same people vote, too; and one of these days their representatives and trusted officials will be reminded of the fact in a forcible manner.
