August 13, says: "The last of seven saloons in Farmington closed its doors to-night at midnight. This leaves five saloons still open in St. Francois county, out of more than thirty which were in existence before the recent local option election. The last two saloons, one at Bonne Terre and one in Frankelay, will close their doors September 6.

The average negro isn't satisfied that he is married until after he has given his wife two or three beatings, but it hasn't become a fixed habit, sanctioned by an "unwritten law," with white people, as, according to the Dunklin Democrat, little diversions of that kind are frowned on in that "best county on earth" and chock full of the "best people." The Democrat gives the result of last week's round-up of wife beaters by Prosecuting Attorney Hall: At Malden Joe Riddle was fined \$5 and costs, and Pearl Kizer \$5 and costs. The latter had also whipped his mother-in-law and a man and was fined \$5 more in each case. At Campbell Frank Smoot was fined \$5 and costs for whipping his wife and another case there has not got to the courts.

**Zalma Postmaster in Trouble.** Cape Girardeau Republican.

Deputy United States Marshal Louis Wilde arrived Wednesday from Poplar Bluff in charge of Francis M. Corbin, formerly postmaster at Zalma, Bollinger county. It was after 10 o'clock when Judge Kage called the prisoner to answer on the bond. E. D. Howe was present for the postoffice department, while Assistant District Attorney Dunes represented the government.

Corbin is under indictment in the district court for the southeastern judicial district of Missouri, charging embezzlement of the postal funds of the postoffice at Zalma, Bollinger county. It appears that Corbin, who is 45 years of age, married, and the father of four children, prior to this bore an enviable reputation among his neighbors and acquaintances for honesty and fair dealing. He was appointed postmaster several years ago without a dissenting endorsement, and at all times was considered a good and faithful officer. But postoffice inspectors, whose scrutinizing examinations reveal the conditions in a postoffice with even severe correctness, last January discovered a shortage of a few hundred dollars in the Zalma office, and while Inspector Howe was engaged in research in the front portion of the little village office Corbin escaped through the back door into the red hills of Bollinger. This was nearly a year ago, and not until Monday was he located in the impenetrable swamps of Arkansas. Inspectors Howe and Pattison,

by a system of decoy letters, made the catch. Corbin was driven over to Jackson at midnight and placed in jail.

Corbin will be tried at the October term of the federal court here. This term is said to be a very important one. Three robberies and three postmasters charged with embezzlement will be on the docket for trial.
