Jackson Cash-Book

Amon Nevens brought two hogs to town the other day and sold them to John Daugherty, the hog-buyer, for \$51.10. Pretty good size hogs, averaging about 365 pounds apiece.

The Altenburg High school building burned the morning of January 2. Very little of the furniture was saved and the loss is estimated at between \$2,500 and \$3,000, with no insurance.

Sheriff Schade returned Sunday from Chicago, where he went after one Ike Bond, colored, who was indicted for killing another colored man named David Lewis in Cape Girardeau in September, 1908. The prisoner refused to return to the state and requisition papers had to be issued. He was arraigned in court this week and his case continued.

The Enterprise Steam laundry at Dexter was destroyed by fire Dec. 23, together with the machinery and contents, entailing a loss estimated at more than \$3,000. The fire was caused by a gasoline explosion. A livery barn near by was also destroyed causing an additional loss of \$1200. There was no insurance on the laundry, but the Dexter Messenger, from which this item is taken, does not say whether the barn was insured or not.

A Cape Girardeau special to the St. Louis Republic, dated January 5, says John Smith, a farmer, was badly injured to-day while riding horseback to the county seat. His animal became frightened and whirling so suddenly on the icy road, fell, crushing the rider. The horse then ran with Smith dangling by one foot in a stirrup, dragging him about sixty yards, where he lay unconscious in the road until a passer-by found him.

John Messenger, a Macon county farmer and cattleman, died in a St. Louis hospital recently. It is recalled that he and Elijah E. Rice had a five years' litigation over the ownership of a steer. The steer was worth about \$30, but both litigants were wealthy and the case was fought to the last ditch, at an expense of more than \$8,000. Messenger charged that Rice had one of his steers in the Rice herd. Rice contended that he raised the steer himself. He finally won the suit.

Fredericktown Tribune

The company which bought the North American mining plant expects to do something in the near future. A bridge for the railroad spur leading to the mines has been ordered and is expected every day and the company is keeping the water pumped out of the mines. If indications point in any direction it is toward the opening up of the mines in the spring. The Tribune has said all the time that there was too much money tied up in the property and the mineral is too rich for the mines to be entirely abandoned.

The county court has made an order that hitch racks be constructed around the public square. On the east and west sides chains will be swung along the square for the people to hitch their horses to. The people ought to have a place to tie up their horses and rigs when they come to town, but it is questionable whether it is the duty of the county to provide the city with such conveniences. The city ought to try to secure a lot as near the business part of town as possible and provide a suitable place for hitching.

There was a dangerous explosion of dynamite, on the eastern part of

the square, last Saturday night. It was done in fun, to welcome in the new year, of course, but did considerable damage, breaking several valuable glass in the Pankey Block, in the court house, and in other buildings. Those responsible for the damage should do the right thing by paying for the broken glass. Should they decline, it may be that a light prosecution will have to be instituted. Handling dynamite is a dangerous and unlawful pastime.

Dan C. Read, a railway mail clerk 33 years old, who hails from Cape Girardeau seems to have made a business of helping himself to registered letters and now he is in the toils of your Uncle Sam's court officers. He confessed to stealing between \$500 and \$800 and said he lost it all gambling. He was arrested January 7 and held under a \$1,000 bond. Read has a wife and three children.

Maiden News

The Dunklin County Bar Association held a meeting at Kennett last Friday and presented Judge J. L. Fort with a handsome gold watch valued at \$350 in token of the high esteem in which he is held by the members of the bar and by the public generally. Judge J. L. Downing of this city was honored with the duty of presenting the watch to Judge Fort, which he did in a speech of a few minutes, and which was pronounced by those who heard it as a masterly piece of oratory, and the best short speech he ever made. Judge Fort responded, but his feelings toward his co-workers at the bar for their sincere expression of appreciation for his services as judge during the past twelve years were more feelingly expressed in his looks than in his words.

Andy Hill, who has been engineer on the regular passenger train of this, the "Cac" branch of the Iron Mountain road for about thirty years was seriously injured, Monday, caused by the overturning of the locomotive on a trestle near Bird's Mill. Mr. Hill fell under the engine and was sent to the Missouri Pacific hospital at St. Louis for treatment. The fireman, Louis Waltemate, was also injured. On account of being no turntable at Bird's Point since the series of cave-ins and washouts, the train is backed from Charleston to that place. The coaches had just passed over the trestle in safety when the engine fell through it. After the wreck the male passengers walked to Bird's Point and the women passengers, baggage, express and mail were conveyed there by wagons.

A Sikeston special to the St. Louis Republic, dated January 9, says: A reception was given Charles M. Smith, Sr., convicted of peonage, upon his return to his home in this city to-day from the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kan. Smith was released from the prison December 19, and friends learned he was to return to-day. A delegation composed of J. C. Lescher, R. A. Norrid, J. W. Marshall, George Tuxhorn, D. H. Clear and Guy E. Cooksey met him in Poplar Bluff. The party left Poplar Bluff for Sikeston at 7 o'clock this morning, and at every stop of the train groups of friends were at the stations to greet him. Judge J. L. Fort, former Circuit Judge of the Twenty-third Judicial Circuit, headed the delegation here. The Sikeston Brass Band played "Home, Sweet Home." Mayor E. J. Malone took Smith in his automobile to the City Hall, where 300 friends had assembled. Mayor Malone, in behalf of the city, welcomed Mr. Smith and gave the floor to him. Mr. Smith said he felt that his experience in prison had added a great deal to his physical and mental health.

BIG COURT DOCUMENT

Poplar Bluff Citizen-Democrat.

The largest document ever filed with a court in the state of Missouri has been filed with Circuit Clerk William McGuire. It comprises the report of the commissioners of the Little River Drainage district, which is to drain 500,000 acres of

overflow lands in Stoddard, Cape Girardeau, Bollinger, New Madrid, Dunklin and Pemiscot counties.

The report proper covering the method of assessment, description of the rights of way to be taken for ditches, floodways and retaining basins, and a complete estimate of cost for this project, covers 530 pages of closely typewritten matter.

The assessment in benefits and damages on lands and railroad right-of-way within the drainage district is so large that it had to be bound in a separate book. This is 500 pages, each 14 by 20 inches in size. It is estimated that there are more than 2,000,000 words and groups of figures in the report.

The board of commissioners composed of Judge W. C. Gramart of Jackson, M. O. Reed of Brookfield, and Luther Conrad of Campbell, was appointed by Judge Shepard last February. After ten months of the hardest kind of work viewing the lands and property within the district they have completed and filed their report.

Judge Shepard will take up the report in vacation and hear any objections to assessments that may be filed by any landowners. On the rendering of his decision accepting the report the board of supervisors of the Little River Drainage district will advertise for the construction of the ditches and floodways.

The estimate of cost embraced in the report places the total cost of construction at \$1,400,000. Using this as a basis the reclamation of this great body of overflowed land will cost the landowners less than \$10 per acre. This is about one-third of what it is costing the government to irrigate the arid lands in the West and Southwest.
