Judge Francis M. Snider died at his home in Whitewater December 5, aged 81 years. He had been in feeble health some time.

Judge Snider was a citizen of Bollinger county nearly all his life, having moved to Whitewater a few years ago, and few men stood higher in the esteem of his neighbors and fellow citizens. He was a man of sober, industrious habits and his word was as good as his bond.

He was a member of the County court two years—1897-1898—and no man could be more conscientious in discharging the duties of a public trust than he.

He leaves a widow, who is a sister of Hon. Geo. H. Barks of near Whitewater, a son, Wilson, who resides in Kansas, and two daughters, Misses William Allman and Dora Hunter. Peace to his ashes.

According to a news item in The St. Louis Post-Dispatch, gasoline will have to get down from its high-priced perch. A substitute has been discovered which may be manufactured at a cost of 1 1/2 cents a gallon, fully equal in power to the Roek-feller fluid, and will revolutionize the automobile industry. It was discovered by John Andrus, a Portuguese inventor of McKeesport, Pa., who was recently paid \$30,000 by the U. S. government for his discovery of a method of toughening armor plate. Carl G. Fisher, president of the Prest-O-Lite company and the Indianapolis Speedway, brought Andrus to that city last July, where he has had the co-operation of the Speedway management and the officials of the National automobile factory in perfecting his compound. Since that time all kinds of tests and demonstrations have been made for automobile officials and expert chemists. The substitute is being made in a soil at the Speedway and Andrus explains to those interested the simplicity of his mixture, keeping secret only two of the ingredients which he says can be bought at any drug store. In tests for speed and miles per gallon, the substitute has exceeded regular gasoline in every instance.
