linger county, Missouri, on SATURDAY, OCTOBER the 25th, 1919, beginning at 1 o'clock p. m. of that day, at which said meeting all members of said society are invited and urged to be present, as there will be very important business matters to be transacted at that time.

There will be submitted for the consideration of the said meeting the following amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of said society, to-wit:

An amendment to prohibit insuring rubber or composition roofing on any building or buildings against windstorms and hailstorms. Also an amendment allowing insurance on automobiles while stored in an insured building the same as farm machinery.

There will also be an amendment offered providing for the election of a trustee from each municipal township in the county in order that the business of the society may have quicker and better attention than it has had in the past with only three trustees. There are eight townships in the county, which will make eight trustees to be elected. The members of the society in each township are requested to consider this matter and agree upon some member of the society who they desire to act as trustee in the township in which they reside so that they may submit his name for election at said annual meeting if said amendment is adopted.

There are likely to be other amendments offered besides the above mentioned amendments and other business of importance to be transacted.
