WHY A ROOSEVELT REPUBLICAN FAVORS COX

I have voted the Republican ticket since 1880 my first vote going to James A. Garfield. I have swallowed the Harding dose to the best of my ability until nature revolted and forced me to support the red-blooded, hard-hitting James M. Cox. Briefly stating my reasons are as follows:

I am for the League of Nations; not a league or an association of nations promised by Harding at some future time with the blood-guilt of Hiram Johnson in the back ground. I cannot understand the platitudes of Harding or his struggling grammes on this question, but I do understand the language of Cox. "I am in favor of going in."

As a follower of Roosevelt I am for progress and not retrogression. Cox as Governor of Ohio

has been positive, fearless, resourceful and his achievements are written in good black ink on the pages of the history of Ohio. Harding as Senator has been negative and has acted simply as a voting unit for the forces of reaction. No better index to the habit of thought and action can be found than his objection to the forward-looking Constitution of Ohio, which he declared would "tear Ohio from her moorings." Through all her industrial trouble not a shot was heard thru all Ohio, and James M. Cox was her able executive.

I prefer the humane stand of President Wilson and Secretary Colby on the Polish question to the attitude of Harding. "It is no concern of ours." It is unthinkable that a selfish conceived America should wrap herself in the Stars and Stripes an turn her back on outraged Armenian womanhood and Poland's plight. Equally amazing for a man of "caution," as Harding is supposed to be, to declare "There will be a complete reversal of our foreign policy."

There is good reason for belief that a large body of our voters give no thought to the issues of the day, but, actuated by a feeling of retaliation, only seek revenge on James M. Cox for a fancied grievance against the president. Their grievance is the winning of the war, and the said in siduous propaganda is again directed at the Government via the punishment of a Democratic Administration. Shall the gospel of hate, retaliation and re-venge

supplant the rule of reason? I know no such creed, and as an American, not a Republican, refuse to aid in the consummation of any such slimy proposition.
