

Teller's Contribution to History.
Senator Teller has made a contribution to history which deserves more attention from the press than it has thus far received. The general belief has been that the silver bullion deposit law of 1890, popularly called the Sherman act, which received the solid support of the Republicans and the solid support of the Democrats, was forced on the Republicans as an escape from free silver. The situation was this: The Senate, on the motion of Plumb, of Kansas, changed a House conditional free silver bill to an out-and-out free silver measure but the House rejected the Senate amendments, and a conference was had which resulted in the framing and enactment of the bill called the Sherman law.

The sponsor of that measure, John Sherman, in his "Recollections of Forty Years," thus tells why it was brought forward: "A large majority of the Senate favored free silver, and it was feared that the small majority against it in the other house might yield and agree to it. The silence of the President on the matter gave rise to an apprehension that if a free coinage bill should pass both houses he would not feel at liberty to veto it." Hence the Sherman compromise measure was put through. Senator Teller puts an entirely different face upon the matter. The silver Republicans, according to the Colorado Senator, determined to place a free silver rider upon the McKinley tariff bill, then before Congress, which measure would, he said, have encountered President Harrison's veto, thus killing free silver and the tariff together. This, and not the fear that a free silver bill might be signed, according to Teller, is "why the Senator from Ohio yielded his judgment." The anti-silver Republicans, he says, accepted what they thought was a lesser evil than free coinage—The Sherman law—which "they thought would answer the purpose of satisfying the silver Republicans and secure their votes" for the tariff.

There is a strong probability that the Colorado Senator tells the plain truth here. His assertions were not challenged by any other Republican in the chamber, which circumstance, coupled with one or two others which are easy to recall, will give them credence. Harrison was on record in his first annual message to Congress, seven months before the passage of the Sherman law, with a strong declaration against free coinage, and there was no reason why he should have changed his mind in the interval. He was on record on the same side just as strongly a few months later. Teller says in his speech that Harrison told many Senators he would veto a free coinage bill if it was passed, and he says Secretary of the Treasury Windom told this to Senators and Representatives "again and again." There is an air of truth about what the Colorado statesman tells which will impress intelligent, unprejudiced persons. The Senator deserves the thanks of the country for throwing light into this dark spot in recent history. The Sherman law, which is the Republican party's only blunder in financial legislation, is now known to have been a part of a deal to secure votes for the tariff, and was as needless as it was disastrous.—Globe-Democrat.

Ordinance No. 572.
An Ordinance regulating the use of bicycles on the public streets and other public places and prescribing penalties for its violation.

SECTION ONE (1.) Each and every bicycle used on any of the streets, avenues, alleys, levees, highways and other public places within this city, shall be provided with a clear sounding bell, that can be heard a distance of one block, and such bell shall be rung when approaching the crossing of another street or highway or when meeting or passing another vehicle, pedestrian or obstacle and when at a distance of forty feet from such crossing, vehicle, pedestrian or obstacle and in time to avoid a collision, and each and every bicycle when used after sun-down in any of said places, shall be provided with a lantern set on the front of same and kept lighted and burning so that it can be seen in advance of the bicycle.

SECTION TWO (2.) Any and every person who shall ride or run a bicycle in this city shall keep on the right hand side of the street, and by right hand side is meant the right hand side when facing in the direction in which such bicycle is going, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a bicycle or bicycles on any public sidewalk within this city; and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to ride a bicycle or bicycles on any street or other public place in this city at a rate of speed greater than ten miles per hour.

SECTION THREE (3.) Any person or persons, who, while riding or using a bicycle or bicycles on any street, avenue, alley, levee or other public place in this city, shall, through carelessness or want of proper precaution or by improper conduct or negligence of any kind, injure or endanger any other person or persons or cause the same to be injured or endangered or shall frighten or cause to be frightened any team of horses or mules or any such single animal, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION FOUR (4.) Any person or persons, who shall willfully and maliciously place or cause to be placed any tacks or glass or any other obstruction upon any street or avenue in this city, whereby any damage may be caused to any bicycle or bicycle rider shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION FIVE (5.) Each and every person using a bicycle in this city shall be held responsible for compliance with this ordinance and any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one dollar nor more than twenty dollars for each and every separate offense.

SECTION SIX (6.) This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the 1st day of July, 1896. Passed by the Council May 18th 1896. WILLIAM H. COEVER, President of the City Council. Approved May 20th, 1896. WILLIAM H. COEVER, Mayor.
