If any of the European nations believe that story that the United States is seeking a "zone of influence" in China they know very little about the sentiment of the American people. The United States wants no territory on the mainland of Asia. It would accept none of it as a gift. We have some valuable islands in Asiatic waters, the Philippines, but we are not seeking any territory on the continent in that part of the world. All the country wants in China is the continuance of the "free-for-all" conditions which have prevailed hitherto. These we probably will have. But we have no desire for possession of any part of China. —Globe-Democrat.

The probability that there will be a surplus of about \$3,000,000 in the government's revenues for October is good news, but it is just the sort of news which was expected. Expenditures are high, on account of the enlargement of the army and the war outlay, but the income has been reaching very gratifying figures for the past few months. Surpluses have been rather frequent recently, and they will probably be the general thing hereafter. October is a month of heavy expenditures, and as the revenue has exceeded them there is a reasonable probability of a handsome excess in November and December, when the outlay is likely to be lower. Uncle Sam's balance sheet is showing the effect of the Republican prosperity. —Globe-Democrat.
