Destructive Fire at Hartville

The east side of the public square at Hartville was visited Monday night by a fire which destroyed six buildings together with their contents. The fire, which is thought to have originated in the Crawford restaurant or in the vacant building adjoining, was discovered about 10:30. It was impossible to save much of the contents of the burned buildings, but by hard work the fire was prevented from destroying other nearby buildings. The flames were plainly visible from here.

Archer's Cafe, owned by E. B. Archer, formerly of Mansfield, had just recently opened for business. The cafe was destroyed, with a loss of about \$1,500; insurance \$900.

The Crawford restaurant was also burned. This building was owned by G. S. Hensley, and Uncle Tom Crawford conducted the business.

The next building burned was also owned by Mr. Hensley. It was vacant, a barber shop having just moved out.

Howe Steele owned the next building burned, a barber shop, conducted by Robert Ellis; loss \$500, no insurance.

The next building burned was owned by Findley Bros. and contained some 'meat market' fixtures; loss on building \$900 with no insurance; loss on contents \$200.

The drug store on the corner of the block was also destroyed. The store was conducted by D. C. Carter, former county treasurer, and the building was owned by Dr. A. J. Farmer; loss on building \$1600, with no insurance; loss on contents \$2,500, insurance \$1,000.
