From the Hunting and Shooting world



Plenty of Quail

Carl W. Mays, famous Boston pitcher, and Horace Paul, have hunted quail in these Ozark sections throughout the season, which has just closed. On commenting on the same, they say there were a large number of coveys, and a larger number of birds this year, than in any previous year. They say, there are more birds left in covey this year, than were to start the season in past years. The quail this season in most cases were found in woods or near wooded sections, very little field feeding being followed this year, and upon closely examining the covey or food deposit one would find a majority of acorns and wild seed. There has been considerable disappointment among quail hunters this year, and any number gave up early and said, "There are no quail this year," but this was for the reason of fast hunting, and early vegetation. If those hunters had gone over the same ground after frost had fallen and hunted carefully they could have enjoyed themselves to the limit. If no changes are made in the bag limit, the Ozarks will have very little field feeding being followed for some time to come.
