### Captured in Springfield

Through the efforts of City Marshal Roe Strong, co-operating with the Springfield police, arrests have been made in connection with the recent robbery of the Reynolds & Coday store here and Miss Maude Reynolds went to Springfield Tuesday and recovered some of the stolen goods. Detectives Strong and Oliver had worked together on previous occasions and accomplished excellent results, and they and the other police working on this case are to be congratulated on their success.

Yesterday's Springfield Republican says:  
Ed Davis, age 67 years, and his son, W. H. Davis, age 29 years; Mrs. Lay, Mrs. Davis, Mrs. McGinnis and Billie Lay of 780 North Campbell street and Emery Melton of Mt. Grove were arrested by police officials last night on a charge of burglary and larceny. The house was searched and a number of articles alleged to have been stolen were recovered. Two sacks of coffee, a number of silk shirts and several articles of clothing were found in the house.

Miss Reynolds of the Reynolds & Coday store of Mansfield identified the shirts and some of the clothing as articles that were missing from their store following a robbery July 15. About the same time of this robbery the Young Mercantile company at Mt. Grove and a clothing store at Seymour were burglarized and about \$1,000 worth of goods taken from each store.

Police officials believe that the parties arrested last night were connected with all three of these robberies. Policeman Dodd will go to Mt. Grove today after Emery Melton. All the other persons were placed in jail last night to await a preliminary hearing before Municipal Judge Thomas R. Gibson.

Chief of Police D. C. Welch and Detectives Oliver, Sampey, Fisher and Dodd have been working on the case for some time.
