STATE OF MISSOURI vs. County of St. Francois. In the Circuit Court of St. Francois county, State of Missouri, to May term, 1908. Sarah J. Byington, Plaintiff, vs. Joseph Byington, Defendant.

Now at this time comes the plaintiff, Joseph Byington, by Merrill B. Doss, his attorney, and files his petition alleging that defendant has absented herself from her usual place of abode in this state, and concealed herself so that the ordinary process of law cannot be served upon her.
