ELECTION OF COUNTY SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT.

An amendment to the law relating to the election of County School Superintendents, to take effect immediately after its passage and signature by the Governor, was passed by the Legislature, and has been certified to the various County Court Clerks by the Secretary of State.

In brief it requires the County Clerk to mail by registered mail to the president or clerk of the board of school directors of the various districts of the county a tally sheet of sufficient size to contain the names of all qualified voters of such district, which shall conform to the form of poll book relating to general elections; and in making returns the tally sheets shall be certified by the chairman and secretary of each annual school meeting and attested by members of the board of directors of the district who may be present. The voting for county superintendent shall be by ballot and all ballots cast shall be counted for the person for whom cast, and it is the duty of the members of the board of directors and the chairman and secretary of the annual school meeting to see that the ballots so cast are counted for the persons receiving same. Within two days the chairman must transmit the tally sheet and all ballots in person or by registered mail to the Clerk of the County Court, the ballots to be in sealed packages separate and apart from the tally sheets, each package being properly designated. Within five days after the annual school meeting the County Clerk shall call to his assistance two justices of the peace or two qualified voters of the county, east up the vote and issue a commission to the person receiving the highest number of votes. Any person upon whom there is imposed an official duty by the act, and who shall violate any of its provision, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction be punished by a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, or by imprisonment in the county jail not less than 30 nor more than 90 days, or by both fine and imprisonment.
