SAYS TREATY ENDS NAVAL COMPETITION

SECRETARY SAYS APPROVAL OF AGREEMENT LEAVES POWERS' SECURITY UNIMPAIRED.

SHANTUNG ACCORD DECLARED

British Formally State for First Time They Are Ready to Give Wei-Hai-Wei Lease Back to the Chinese Government.

Washington.—The Washington negotiations for limitation of armament reached their consummation when a plenary session of the arms conference gave definite and public approval to the two treaties limiting navies and restricting the use of new agencies of warfare.

One of the covenants thus sealed after eleven weeks of debate establishes a fixed ratio of capital ship strength between the five great powers, and the other pledges them against unrestricted submarine warfare and use of poison gas. Within a day or two the plenipotentiaries of the United States, Great Britain, Japan, France and Italy, will formally affix their signatures.

"The naval treaty absolutely ends the race in naval competition," Secretary Hughes told the conference. "At the same time it leaves the security of the powers unimpaired, but it means more. The best thing is the spirit manifested, by which he are able to reach this conclusion."

"We are taking the greatest forward steps to establish the reign of peace," he added.

U. S. to Be Party to Seven Treaties.
Unless present plans are changed, the Washington conference will give to the world eight treaties, to seven of which the United States will be a party. They are:

Four-power Pacific treaty, signed on December 13.

Five-power naval limitation treaty, ready for signature.

Five-power submarine and poison gas treaty, ready for signature.

Six-power treaty allocating German Pacific cables, drafting.

Nine-power treaty on Chinese tariff, drafting.

Nine-power treaty on other Chinese questions, drafting.

American-Japanese treaty regarding Yap, virtually ready for signature.

Chinese-Japanese treaty regarding Shantung, near completion.

At the same session the Far Eastern wing of the conference moved toward completion of its tasks by announcing officially the terms of the Shantung settlement and by giving final approval to nine of the resolutions adopted in committee in regard to Chinese problems. The agreement on Shantung already has been put into a draft treaty between Japan and China, and the other Far Eastern settlements are to be embodied in at least two general conventions which will come before the conference shortly.

FAULTY CONSTRUCTION CAUSE OF DISASTER

CAUSE OF THEATER DISASTER FATAL TO 97.

Roof Beams in Knickerbocker Never Were Fastened to Walls, Senator Capper Reports.

Washington.—Bad engineering, coupled with cheap and faulty construction, was held responsible for the collapse of the roof of the Knickerbocker Theater and the resultant loss of 97 lives, by Senator Capper of Kansas, in a statement issued after an investigation of the ruins of the ill-fated structure.

Senator Capper, who, as a member of the Senate District of Columbia Committee, introduced a resolution providing for Senate investigation of the disaster, was accompanied in his inspection of the scene by Senators Jones of Washington, Gooding of Idaho, Sheppard of Texas and Weller of Maryland, all members of the District committee, and Representative Upham of Georgia, whose niece, Miss Caroline Upham, was injured.

Coincident with Senator Capper's statement, the American Association of Engineers, through its office here issued a statement in which it declared: "It was evidently due to faulty design or construction, which would not have existed had licensed engineers or architects supervised the work." The association had a committee investigating the collapse.

Rum Mash Blocks City Sewers.
Butte, Mont.—City sewers on Butte's East Side are blocked by large deposits of moonshine mash, including prune seeds, rye, barley, raisins, corn and cherry pits. City Engineer Henry J. Wigenstein said.

Sergt. Lee Henry of the marine corps and four members of the police force at Managua, Nicaragua, were killed in fight when the police overtook Henry and three marine corporals who had been reported as deserters from the marine detachment the day before.

Blood Tests for Officers of Army



For the first time since 1917 army officers were subjected to blood tests recently at Governor's Island, New York. Failure to pass successfully meant enforced retirement from active service. Three hundred officers underwent the examination.

SENATE PASSES ALLIED DEBT REFUNDING BILL

COMMISSION TO SUPERVISE AND ENFORCE COLLECTION OF THE INTEREST ON \$11,000,000,000.

COUNT OF VOTE STOOD 39-25

Powers to Cancel Claims Taken Out—Proposal to Pay Soldier Bonus from Revenue Falls, as Do Other Amendments.

Washington.—The bill authorizing the refunding of the \$11,000,000,000 foreign debt into securities maturing in not less than 25 years was passed by the Senate.

The vote was 39 to 25. Final enactment of the measure must await adjustment of differences between House and Senate.

Three Republicans—Borah, La Follette and Norris—joined with the solid Democratic minority in opposing the bill.

Under the terms of the bill a commission of five members, headed by the Secretary of the Treasury, would have authority, subject to the approval of the President, to refund or convert and to extend beyond June 15, 1947, and the interest rate cannot be less than 4 1/2 per cent. Bonds of one foreign government cannot be accepted for those of another, nor can any part of the foreign indebtedness be cancelled.

The life of the commission will be three years from the time the act is approved, and members, other than the Secretary of the Treasury, will be appointed by the President, subject to confirmation by the Senate. During its life the commission will be required to make annual reports to Congress at the beginning of each regular session.

Only cabinet members and Congressmen will be appointed on the commission, according to Senator Watson (Rep.) Indiana, who told the Senate that he knew that this was the President's intention.

Aside from the section proposing that interest on the refunded debt be not less than 4 1/2 per cent, which is added as an amendment from the finance committee, the only important change the Senate made was the elimination of a provision which would have given the commission authority to settle and refund any future claims of the United States against "any foreign government."

Efforts to add a soldiers' bonus provision to the measure; to limit the authority of the commission in deferring interest payments, and to require congressional approval of the bond conversion agreements failed.

Woman Sock Knitter, 101, Dies.
Charlottetown, P. E. I.—Mrs. William Gibson, 101 years old, of Marshfield, Prince Edward Island, who knitted 80 pairs of socks for Canadian soldiers during the great war, is dead.

Dies of Injuries Received in Riot.
Marquette, Mich.—T. B. Catlin, warden at the Michigan State Prison, died here from injuries received in a prison riot a month ago.

Asteroid Reported Circling Saturn.
Chicago.—An astronomical body, appearing to be an asteroid, which is similar to a small comet, has been circling about Saturn, according to Prof. Edwin B. Frost of the University of Chicago, who is here from the Yerkes Observatory at Lake Geneva.

9 Hurt in Explosion at Home.
East Liverpool, O.—Nine persons were seriously injured when an explosion of natural gas blew the six-room home of Adam Youkloski from its foundation at Sallenville, near here.

SLAIN MAN LAST SEEN WITH ACTRESS

MOVIE STAR VISITED HIS BUNGALOW, SERVANT OF FILM DIRECTOR SAYS.

'JEALOUS WOMAN' IS THEORY

Mabel Normand Is Questioned by the Police When Negro Butler Tells of Having Left Her Alone With W. D. Taylor.

Los Angeles, Cal.—Los Angeles was shocked by another heinous murder mystery when the body of William Desmond Taylor, 50, chief director of the Lasky Studios, was found in his home at 404 South Alvarado street. Taylor had been shot through the heart.

The gruesome discovery was made by Henry Peasey, a negro servant, when he arrived at the home where Taylor lived alone. The body was lying beside a desk, where he had been going over a number of cancelled checks that he had received from the bank.

Among the last persons known to have seen Taylor alive was Mabel Normand, film comedienne, it was announced by detectives.

Peasey told the police that about 7 o'clock, when he had nearly finished serving dinner to Taylor, Miss Normand called to see the director.

Miss Normand was questioned by the police, who said she unhesitatingly told of the visit. She had stopped at Taylor's apartments to return a borrowed book, she said, and talked with him about recent robberies of his home.

She said Taylor accompanied her to her automobile when she left, and her chauffeur corroborated her statements, according to the police.

Miss Normand's departure, it was said, was almost simultaneous with that of Peasey.

The name of Edna Purviance, also a motion picture actress, whose apartment is near that occupied by Taylor, also was in public print in connection with the director's death, when it was learned she telephoned ward of the tragedy to Miss Normand, the police stated.

Taylor was to telephone to her later in the evening, Miss Normand said, but did not do so.

Miss Edna Purviance lives in a house adjoining the Taylor bungalow. She returned home about midnight and saw the light burning in Taylor's apartment.

Other female acquaintances of the director will be questioned. The theory now being worked on is that a jealous woman either shot Taylor or had him shot. That a woman actually did the slaying is the more generally accepted theory.

E. H. SHAUGHNESSY DIES FROM INJURIES

Second Assistant Postmaster General Was Hurt in Recent Washington, D. C., Theater Disaster.

Washington.—Edward H. Shaughnessy of Chicago, second assistant postmaster general, died here at Walter Reed Hospital from injuries received in the Knickerbocker Theater disaster.

Although Shaughnessy's injuries were known to be of a critical nature, his condition had shown improvement up to shortly before his death, and his death was unexpected. Attending physicians at the Army Hospital, to which Shaughnessy was taken when removed from the wreckage of the motion-picture theater several hours after the collapse of its roof, which caused nearly a hundred fatalities, said his death followed a sudden heart collapse. This was predicted, they said, by developments of internal complications the day before. Shaughnessy suffered a broken pelvis and other injuries in the accident, but for several days had shown a resistive power that made physicians hopeful of his ultimate recovery.

Shaughnessy's wife and his 10-year-old daughter, Ruth, both of whom are now recovering from injuries received in the theater disaster, had not been informed of his death. They are being treated at another hospital, the daughter having had both arms broken, while Mrs. Shaughnessy is suffering from a fractured rib and shock.

Child's Sled Not Pleasure Vehicle.
New York.—A child's sled is not a pleasure vehicle, Magistrate Hatting ruled. He found Jacob Elmsner and Harry Yurshinsky, fathers, guilty of violating a city ordinance of drawing their progeny through Central Park on sleds, but suspended sentence.

Botulinus Poison Kills Man.
Santa Rosa, Cal.—Joe Pastori of Healdsburg, near here, died, and his wife and 22-year-old son were at the point of death from what physicians pronounced botulinus poisoning, believed to have been caused by eating home-preserved beans.

1,200 Iron Molders Vote Pay Cut.
Cincinnati.—Twelve hundred iron molders in the Cincinnati district voted to accept a reduction in wages from \$6 to \$5.50 a day. The molders have been idle since January 1.

60,000 Jack Rabbits Poisoned.
Bend, Ore.—Sixty thousand jack rabbits killed in three weeks as the result of eating poison-saturated rye is the record established by state and biological survey employes, who are conducting a campaign against the pests in the Fort Rock Valley.

Woman Is Robbed of \$30,000.
New York.—Mrs. Max Gitelmacher, wife of a physician, was robbed of \$30,000 by two men who attacked her as she was about to enter her home, she reported to the police.
