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MISSOURI GRAIN CROPS
Jefferson City, Mo., Aug. 14.—Missouri grain crops total 243,921,000 bushels in 1922 compared to 260,139,000 in 1921, according to E. A. Logan and Jewell Mayes of the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service, the reduction being due to a short oat crop. Corn improved 12 points during July, due to liberal rains in major portions of best corn counties. Serious overflows destroyed many fields in bottom lands of Grand, Platte and 102 Rivers. Early corn is earing fine, middle planting is tasseling, but late fields stand in danger from early September frosts.
Wheat averages 12.5 bushels per acre indicating 36,813,000 bushels. Threshing is nearing completion. Grades are good except that rains have lowered quality in extreme northern counties. Plowing for fall wheat is now well under way.
Oats are shortest crop in past eleven years, averaging 17 bushels per acre, totaling 21,913,000 bushels. The

quality is poor. Oats are being shipped in. A large percentage of the acreage was too short to cut for grain and was either mown for hay, pastured, or totally abandoned.

KEEP THE HESSIAN FLY OUT
Though a notable victory has been gained over the hessian fly in Missouri, Director A. J. Meyer of the Agricultural Extension Service thus concisely sums up the reasons for even greater vigilance:
Over most of Missouri the Hessian fly has caused relatively little damage this year, due undoubtedly to the fact that the very large proportion of Missouri wheat growers delayed sowing until after the fly-free date last fall.
The Hessian fly is never completely down and out. Give it an early sown crop of wheat to feed on this fall, and another year will probably see Hessian fly damage restored to normal.
This is the time to keep the invader out of Missouri's wheat fields. Plow early, destroy volunteer wheat and observe the fly-free date at sowing time.
This is the time to apply the proverbial ounce of prevention.

It is estimated by the Missouri Committee on Public Utility Information, 3725 North Broadway, St. Louis, that Missouri utilities have lost to Aug. 1, \$525,000 through the coal strike.
If the strike should continue through August and September, the monthly loss will be greatly increased. As the utilities operate under rates set by the Public Service Commission they cannot pass on these losses to their customers, but must absorb them themselves.
THE BIBLE AS A SERIAL
After printing a weekly serial from the Bible for three months, the Topeka State Journal finds this to be the most successful feature the paper has ever published. Inquiries and comment concerning it have come to the editors from every state in the Union, and from numerous foreign countries. Following the lead of the Journal, several other Kansas papers are also publishing the Bible. Publication of the Bible by the Journal was undertaken at the suggestion of Dr. Charles M. Skeldon, author of "In His Steps". Each installment consists of about 3700 words, the Weymouth text of the New Testament being used.

HARD SET BY COAL STRIKE, MISSOURI UTILITIES HAVE MAINTAINED 100 PER CENT SERVICE
Although that they did not anticipate a coal strike of over ninety days, ending July 1, the privately gas, water supply, electric light and electric railway companies of Missouri have managed by extraordinary effort to maintain full service in various parts of the State in the face of almost insurmountable difficulties.
While the railroads have been obliged to cancel hundreds of trains, and while many other industries have materially decreased production, the privately owned public utilities of Missouri have, without a single exception, continued to function 100 per cent to date.
Some of the smaller utilities in the state have been hard driven to secure coal, but so far they have managed to get it. They have been obliged to open small strip and pocket mines in their immediate neighborhoods, and truck the coal in. This makes what is usually an inferior grade of coal, cost the utility less from \$6.50 to \$7.50 a ton, whereas the contract price for high grade coal to the same utilities, prior to April 1, was \$4.50 per ton. The increase in coal prices is about 50 per cent, the decrease in fuel efficiency about 40 per cent, a total increase in cost to the utilities of 90 per cent.
The utilities about Edina, Kirksville, California and many other plants in the Central Missouri valley, are getting most of their coal from local mines. There are some excellent fields around Richmond and Bevier, but the miners there are members of the United Mine Workers, and have been
