County Court Proceedings.

County Court met in adjourned session last Tuesday, September 5th, and there was present J. K. Langford, presiding judge; L. A. Harper, associate judge for the eastern district; S. E. Glone, associate judge for the western district; John J. Kennon, clerk; E. S. Williams, sheriff.

The following business was transacted.

The boundary line of Varner and Washington townships was changed as follows: Take from Washington township and add to Varner township the north half of sections 25 and 26, all of sections 23 and 24 in township 23, north, range 3 east, and the north half of sections 29 and 30 and all of section 19 in township 23 north, range 4 east, in Ripley County Missouri.

The resignation of E. F. O'Neal, as a Justice of the Peace in Shibley township, was accepted.

PARTY SUFFRAGE RECORDS.

Only Democratic Congressmen Appealed For Action.

Congressman C. C. Dill of Washington cites the records of the committee hearings on suffrage in congress to prove that "the only congressmen who have gone before the judiciary committee of congress this year to ask that a suffrage amendment be voted upon have been Democratic members."

This record need only be supplemented with the personal voting history of the rival presidential candidates to show who is the real friend of suffrage. President Wilson made two trips from Washington to New Jersey to register and vote for woman suffrage when it was submitted in his state.
