

Correspondence of the Ledger. Mexico, Mo., August 3, 1893.—The center of attraction to a great majority of visitors is the Manufactures and Liberal Arts building. To form some conception of the size of the building, stand in the center of a forty acre field, and remember that the flooring, including gallery, will more than cover the field. This immense structure is filled with the manufactured products of the world. What the genius of man can devise, and the combined skill of the human race can execute, is here shown to a greater extent than anywhere on the grounds. Here are the peculiar characteristics; the differentiating genius of the different nations. To me the wonders of human genius are shown more in the Machinery and Electrical buildings, but in this all the phases of peculiar intellect of each country is set forth in such an attractive way that here only you can distinctly separate the nationalities. Here, in connection with the separate national buildings in other parts of the ground, you can feel you have been abroad, and visited the different countries of the world. As you enter from the South, turn to your left and you are unmistakably in Italy—fair Italia! The land of bright skies, and song, and sculpture. You will be disappointed in the Art Building in not finding what you expected in Statuary, but here you will find the human form carved, moulded, and chiseled in every conceivable attitude. And with these polite Italians attending you, as you see the beautiful gondolas, with their skillful oarsmen gliding by in lagoons on each side of the building, you can easily imagine that you are really in Florence or Venice. As you pass from Italy to Russia you are chilled by the striking contrast, and yet in this cold country of oppression you find evidence of skill and culture that you little expected, and will linger long, especially in the grand fur display. Their Pagoda is one of the finest in the building. Here I found the only merchant that we could not make understand us in English, as we were negotiating with him for some Moscow spoons. You may think the far off, cold country of Denmark will furnish you little of interest, but call in and be undeceived; especially see that wonderful carved historic shield, valued at \$150,000, and the vase at \$8000. Now go to France, and if you have any ladies with you expect to stay all day. Before entering, stand on the opposite side of Columbia Avenue, and note the richly figured Goblin Room, indicating that this can be none other than the vertebly city of Paris. Go in and see for yourself, for I dare not attempt to describe the beauties of Paris, in her rich displays of decorative art, jewelry, bronzes, ceramic furniture, wax figures, carpets, and elegant textures of every conceivable kind. Some of the wealthiest firms and richest displays are in the gallery overhead. A jewel case and wedding box was the coveted object of all eyes, but my purse could not reach it at \$20,000, much less the diamond at \$120,000. The English Pavilion is an exact reproduction of the famous dining room at Hatfield House, the best specimen of Elizabethan architecture extant, and is the place where Henry VIII and Queen Elizabeth took their daily meals. But the time for our appointment at the Fisheries Building has come, so we must pass on. The guide books call it an "Architectural Poem," and so it seems. The cost of the ornate structure was \$224,000, a big pile of money to devote to fish. But what delightful recreation is this after the exhausting tour you have made of the Manufactures or other buildings, to drop in here, in this cool refreshing place, and live with the fish awhile. The exhilarating influence of a first visit here is indescribable. Fish little and big, from ocean, sea, lake and river, of all imaginable and grotesque shapes. From the speckled beauties of stream and lake, to the inhabitants of the deep sea grottoes, the builder of islands and continents, sea anemones, and monstrous devil fish, sharks, and other monsters of the deep; not pickled and dried, but alive and showing off in their native element. Everything that science has rescued from the waters of the globe is displayed here. Around the central basin of crystal water with fountains and caverns, in which swim the finny tribes in variegated beauty, teeming the book and line and all Isaac Walton, you will always find gathered a delightful circle of spectators of men, women and children, for the fish speak a common language for all. Perhaps the most beautiful exhibit is the Anemone Grotto. Besides the live fish display, everything connected with the fish, fishing, fish farming, propagation, and all the implements of commercial fishing are here displayed. H. K. HINDE.

Governor Stone and the Republic.

MEXICO, Mo., August 3.—The Republic in its issue of July 31st criticizes Governor Stone's position on the coinage question, and thus interrogates the Governor. "Does he admit or not that if the purchase of bullion were stopped, the redemption of treasury notes in silver—in other words, the execution of the Sherman act he desires—might appear to the Secretary of the Treasury a perfectly safe use of his discretion?" We submit that the answer of the Governor to this question might be either, yes, or no, and it could not in the slightest degree shake the unanswerable plea of Governor Stone for honest money. Every enemy of silver wants its coinage—more properly speaking its destruction, left to the discretion of the Secretary; that is as long as he exercises that "discretion" for its destruction—and no longer; and everybody knows that the coinage of silver is in the hands of its enemies, and every patriotic citizen, who wishes to stop the destruction of credit, labor, commerce and general prosperity, is with Gov. Stone, and hoping that enough patriotism and justice may develop itself at the special session of Congress, to restore the coinage to its status under the Bland law, with the addition that it be coined unlimited, be made a legal tender for all debts and with the further elimination, that all "discretion" be taken from the Secretary of the Treasury; that "discretion" has always been the tooth of Shermanism; pull that fang and the snake in Wall Street will die. DESPERADOES THWARTED.

Dastardly Plans to Wreck and Rob a Washash Train Discovered by Accident. MAISON, Mo., Aug. 4.—A desperate attempt to wreck and rob the southbound Washash passenger train one mile north of Atlanta, this morning at 1 o'clock, was planned by two unknown desperadoes, but fortunately was frustrated. The train was due at Atlanta at about 1 o'clock from Des Moines. It had several coaches and two sleepers and it is understood the express car vaults contained considerable money. H. Johns, aged 18 years, son of the station agent at Atlanta, had been up the railroad visiting somewhere, and on his return home about 11:30 o'clock overheard two men who were concealed near the railroad behind a pile of cross ties talking about wrecking and robbing the train. He went to Atlanta and securing a lantern went up the wagon road to meet the train before it reached the point where the men were. The train stopped when Johns flagged it and Trainmaster J. A. Rather, Conductor Richard Murry and the other parties connected with the train started down the track. They found that on a curve and on a twenty foot high grade just at the north end of a bridge a whole steel rail had been taken out. The section hands' tools had been stolen and used in extracting the spikes and were still left there. The train was delayed thirty minutes while the rail was being replaced. It is not known who the desperadoes are, but it is not believed that they were green hands. The train was not scheduled to stop at Atlanta and was running at the rate of about forty miles an hour when flagged. Sheriff White of Macon is at Trenton to witness the hanging of Jos. A. Congressman U. S. Hall Will Introduce a Bill to Stop them.

Congressman U. S. Hall, of Missouri, will introduce a bill in congress that will create somewhat of a sensation when its purpose is understood.

Congressman Hall spent two weeks in the City of Washington looking over the pension records, and he has compiled figures showing that over \$21,000,000 is paid out annually to pensioners in European countries.

As a result of this investigation he will introduce a bill in Congress to stop the payment of pensions except to citizens of the United States. He will make a vigorous fight to pass this measure.
