Kirksville, Mo., March 23.—A destructive cyclone swept the country near Williamsville, about 30 miles northeast of here, blowing down several barns and farmhouses and killing two people.

The house of Lawson was wrecked and his child killed. The other members of the family were seriously injured and some of them may die from the results.

SAFE ROBBERS GOT \$6,400. Fire from a Barricade Kept Mounds Ok, Residents From Pursuing.

Muskogee, Ok., April 2.—Robbers blew open the safe of the Bank of Mounds at Mounds, Ok., fifty miles west of here, at 3 o'clock this morning and obtained \$6,400 in paper currency and silver, with which they made off in the direction of this city. The robbers are said to have been three in number.

When the charge which blew open the bank safe was set off the detonation waked half the town, but the robbers kept up a constant fusillade from behind a barricade of barbed wire, barrels and boxes which they had erected in the street, and they retreated to their horses in safety.

News from Mounds and surrounding towns are out after the robbers and the sheriffs over every county in the district have been told to be on the lookout for the men.

Costs Her \$300,000 a Year. Report at Jefferson City is that Ill Health Will Compel Attorney-General to Withdraw.

Jefferson City, April 2.—That Attorney-General Herbert S. Hadley will not be a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, owing to the condition of his health, is the impression which prevails here.

It is stated, upon what is considered reliable authority, that he will issue a statement within the next few days definitely announcing that he will not make the race.

For several weeks the state of General Hadley's health has been such that his physicians fear that a campaign for governor would break him down. A few days ago General Hadley went to Kansas City and specialists carefully examined him.

It is believed that if he withdraws from the race for governor he will not seek any other office. If General Hadley decides to stay out it is believed that John C. McKinley, lieutenant-governor; John E. Swanger, secretary of state; and J. H. Botwell, vice-chairman of the Republican state committee, may become candidates.

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
