It may include samples of corn, soybeans, rape, clover, wheat, oats, sorghum, pumpkins, melons, potatoes, etc. "There will be at least three premiums offered for this exhibit. The first premium will be worth at least \$25.00. "We want this exhibit brought in Monday, Nov. 2nd, and it should remain on exhibit until the close of the week. It will suit me exactly to speak at the Mexico Round Up Monday night, Nov. 2nd. Of course, there will be no politics in my speech, but I will discuss the progress of nation and state. All of this, if Congress adjourns. CHAMP CLARK.

Provided Congress adjourns in time, the Audrain County Round-Up will be opened with a speech by the Hon. Champ Clark, speaker of the House of Representatives and Representative in Congress from this district. In a telegram of acceptance to Fred Pilcher, president of the Commercial Club, Mr. Clark said, "of course, there will be no politics in my speech." However, he will review the progress of the United States and the state of Missouri. The appearance of Mr. Clark at the opening of the Round Up will be a great attraction as this will be his first speech in his home district in several months. 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
