Beatty lives about nine miles southwest of this city and Stone's family are residents of Boone County. A warrant has been sworn out by Stone for the arrest of Beatty. He is charged with the intention to murder. Although no particulars could be learned about the incident, it is thought the action followed an argument between the two men. The wounds made on Mr. Stone's head were very painful and may result seriously although it is thought he will recover.
