

# COURT HOUSE

County Superintendent Ed C. Offutt is in receipt of a petition signed by ten tax-payers from School Districts 91 and 96 asking that the 212 acres of land belonging to H. F. Price be changed to be in District Number 95 instead of 91. The reason for this is given as the fact that Mr. Price is nearer to the Hisey School than to the Cedar Grove School, which is in the district in which his land now lies.

If the petition is granted it will probably be arranged to take some taxable land from 95 and give it to 91 to make up for the loss to 91 by this change.

## FOUR DEMANDS FILED.

Three demands against the A. S. J. Harrison estate were filed with the Probate Court Monday. Lewellyn and Son made demand in the sum of \$42.85. Phillips in the sum of \$56.75 and McPheeters Brothers \$515.

In the estate of Jennie B. Beatty, Marie Tilford filed a demand for \$16.15, and the administrator waived the demand.

## BAEHR GETS \$3,100.

Edward L. Baehr was given \$3,100 in a settlement made out of court in his suit against the A. P. Green Fire Brick Company. The case was to have come up before the Circuit Court for trial Tuesday morning, but settlement was made before any of the witnesses had been put on the stand.

Baehr was suing the Brick Company for \$25,000 for injuries to his right hand and arm, received on January 25, 1919 while the plaintiff was in the service of the defendant as a dry pan foreman. He alleged in his petition that because of neglect on the part of the Brick Company machinery had been left exposed in such a manner that it had injured him through no fault of his own. His right arm and hand have been rendered useless, he states and he is no longer able to do his customary work.

## ADMINISTRATOR APPEALS.

For the second time John W. Howell, administrator of the Frank Heckler estate, has appealed the case of Mary Ewing against him, and it will now go to the St. Louis Court of Appeals. Mrs. Ewing was given a judgment of \$9,000 in the Probate Court, and in the Circuit Court, to which Mr. Howell appealed, she was given \$7,000, for the care she took of Frank Heckler during the last twelve years of his life when he lived in her home.

## TO BE TRIED AGAIN IN JUNE.

The case of Dr. T.M. Monroe against the Chicago and Alton Railroad et al, which was tried in the Audrain Circuit Court in June, 1915, before

Judge J. D. Barnett, when a verdict was rendered for the defendant, has been reversed and remanded by the Supreme Court of Missouri and sent to the court here for a new trial, in the June term. Then mandate was received by Clerk E. F. Elliott Tuesday morning. The decision was reversed by the Supreme Court on instructions offered by the defendant.

Monday was spent in the Circuit Court by hearing motions and attending to routine business, the jury having been dismissed until Tuesday morning. The case of the State of Missouri against Solomon Fox was continued to the June term of court on account of the illness of the defendant who is 84 years old.
