

DEATHS

Hugh Edward Donnelly died at his home on W. Monroe street in this city about 10 o'clock Wednesday night, after having been ill but a short time with heart disease. He has been away from his work at the A. P. Green Fire Brick Co., where he was employed as a shipping clerk, for about two weeks, but has not been confined to his bed and was not thought to be in serious condition. He went to church Sunday and as he was returning he suffered a slight attack of heart trouble. Since that time he has not been up, but has not been very sick.

Mr. Donnelly leaves a wife, a little daughter, Clara, four years old, and a ten months-old baby girl. He is also survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh P. Donnelly, both of whom were born in Ireland; five sisters, Mrs. Joe Hayden, of Kansas City; Mrs. M. H. Murphy, Mrs. Harry Brown, Mrs. Harvey Lackland and Miss Agnes Donnelly, all of Mexico; and a brother, Frank, of Nebraska.

He was born in Audrain County April 2, 1881. He has lived in Mexico practically all of his life and was educated in the schools here. He is a member of the Catholic Church.

John David McGee, 44 years old, who for thirteen years was connected with Otis Purdy in the drug business here, died at the County Hospital Friday morning at 7:45 o'clock following an operation for appendicitis Wednesday. Mr. McGee was taken ill Sunday and brought immediately to this city. The funeral was Sunday afternoon in Bowling Green.

Mr. McGee was born in this county near Young's Creek. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McGee, early settlers, and both of whom are now dead. Six years ago he went to Bowling Green where he entered the drug business. Mr. McGee was an exceptionally fine man, popular with all who knew him and possessing the highest ideals. His death will sadden a wide circle of friends both here and in Bowling Green.

Besides his wife, who was Miss Nell Burhop, daughter of J. N. Burhop, formerly of this city, he leaves two little children, Kenneth Claude and John David McGee, Jr. He is also mourned by the following brothers and sisters: Miss Belle McGee, of Mexico; F. L. of this county; Dr. B. C., of Sherman, Texas; and C. C. McGee, of Chanute, Kas.

Mr. McGee married Miss Nell Burhop, at the home of her father in this city, October 2nd, 1907. Mrs. McGee was as popular as her husband here and when they moved to Bowling Green to make their home had the best wishes of everyone here.

COURT HOUSE

Field Alford has filed a suit against Davis A. Sutton on a note.

C. C. Lewellen has filed against B. R. Middleton a suit on a note for \$500, only \$100 of which has been paid, according to the petition of the plaintiff.

Cecil Adams, against whom the state has filed an abandonment suit to be tried in the June term of Court, was found working in Omaha, Neb., and was brought to Mexico and put in the jail by Sheriff J. H. Ford Sunday. Adams waived requisition papers and came with the sheriff of his own accord; therefore a permit from the governor of Nebraska was not necessary, as it would have been had the prisoner protested his arrest.

Jewell Adams, the wife of Cecil Adams, made affidavit to the effect that her husband deserted her and her six-months-old son, Cecil Roy Adams, on August 13, 1919 and that he has failed to support them since that time.

A temporary injunction, restraining Ross B. Cauthorn, county clerk, from extending the tax books to include a tax of 60 cents on the \$100 for maintenance and \$1.00 in the \$100 for repairs on the tax payers in School District number 13 at Laddonia, was issued by Judge E. S. Gantt at a hearing in chambers held Monday morning.

The injunction was granted upon the petition of Chris Marburg, James Coons and A. E. Hoyt, in behalf of other voters in the school district, who filed suit against Ross B. Cauthorn. The case will be heard in the June term of court, when decision upon a permanent injunction will be made. The temporary injunction granted by Judge Gantt holds only until June 7.

It is alleged by the plaintiffs that at the school election, April 6, 1920, when the tax levy was voted upon, that the required two-thirds majority was not obtained, but that the

clerk of the district instructed the county clerk to extend the tax books.

In the estate of Maxie P. Morris, the administrator, J. W. Howell, filed receipts and vouchers with the Probate Court showing a balance for distribution of \$1703.28. Mr. Howell also made a settlement in the G. T. Loughman estate, of which he is administrator, showing a balance of \$0.62.

Martin Hoer, administrator of the Jos. Lennemann estate, filed with the court accounts and vouchers showing a balance of \$4426.34.

In the estate of Anna C. Lutz, the administrator, Theodore J. Williams, reported that all costs had been paid and he was discharged.

August Meyer filed with the court an inventory of the real estate belonging to the estate of Henry C. Weber.

In the state of Lucy H. Moore a balance of \$12,816.32 was reported for distribution and an order was issued to Annie L. Moore, the administratrix.

Lucille Thompson, a minor over the age of 14 years, asked that her mother be appointed guardian and the latter gave bond for \$1400.

In the estate of John B. Gabriel, the administratrix, Christine Gabriel, filed accounts and vouchers showing a balance due of \$745.93.

Mrs. Sarah Foreman, administratrix in the estate of her husband, William F. Foreman, filed an inventory appraising the personal property in the estate at \$3,445.12. She asked for \$400 absolute property, the household goods and a year's support for the widow and children.

In the estate of Minnie A. Rogers, the administrator, William Park Rogers, filed a motion for \$400 absolute

property and \$600 for a year's support.

In the estate of William F. Maiden a balance of \$426.68 was reported due, and final settlement was left pending until proof of final settlement is made.

Enser Taylor and Maurice Abbing-ton, of Vandalia, have been arrested for grand larceny on a charge of having stolen ten cases of eggs valued at \$125 from Botts-Putman Mercantile Company, a corporation of Vandalia, on March 29, 1920. The defendants were arraigned before Justice R. B. Hooton, pleaded guilty and waived preliminary hearing. They were released on bonds of \$300 and bound over to the June term of the Circuit Court.

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OBITUARY.

Hugh Donnelly, Jr., died Wednesday.

Hugh Edward Donnelly, 39 years old, Traffic Superintendent of the A. P. Green Fire Brick Co., died at 8:30 o'clock Wednesday night at his home on East Jackson street. He suffered an attack of influenza in January and since then has been a subject of heart trouble, which according to the physician was the cause of his death. Deceased was born in Mexico in 1881 and lived here his life time. In 1912 he was married to Miss Adele Goede of St. Louis. Three children were born unto this union. They are Martha Agnes, aged 4 years, Mary Catherine, 9 months and Clara Marie, who died last year. Mr. Donnelly was a member of the Catholic church and of the Holy Name Society. He was popular with all who knew him, he was highly respected by his employer and his associates. A Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Father T. O'Sullivan at St. Brendan's church at 9 o'clock Saturday morning. The church was crowded to capacity and many friends were unable to enter. The floral offerings were profuse ones and the altars were decorated with them.

Father O'Sullivan in his sermon commented on the life of the deceased man. He pointed to his close relationship with the church, his confession, his relationship with his employer and his fellowman. He referred to the large number gathered in the church, of all creeds as testimony of the high esteem in which Mr. Don-

nelly was held in this community.

The officers of the A. P. Green Fire Brick Co., and men with whom he worked all attended in a body and the plant suspended business during the funeral. The body was laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery and the following friends were bearers: Harrison Brown, Felix Guignon, Albert Hendrix, Carl Dobyns, C. E. Sharp, James Burke.
