Short Courses Begin November 1. COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 21.—The first day of November is the time set for registration of students in the Two-Year Winter Course in Agriculture and the Short Course in Home Economics for Women at the University of Missouri.

This is a particularly fortunate date for those interested in athletics. The bulk of the home games for the University Tigers, last year's champions of the Missouri Valley in football, will begin in Columbia that week-end and come to a climax with the Kansas game on Thanksgiving Day. Students entering the Short Courses therefore will see practically as much of the football season as those who entered the regular session on September 1.

It is a fact that farmers are beginning to appreciate the need of special training in agriculture, according to Sam B. Shirky, in charge of the courses. This is especially true since land values have increased so that they must make their farms pay a greater income.

The Two-Year Winter Course in Agriculture has been designed to make better and more prosperous farmers. Opportunity is given to the students for specialization in any branch that they like best and are most suited for. Courses are offered in animal husbandry, field crops, poultry husbandry, soils, veterinary science, dairying, horticulture, agricultural engineering, entomology, rural life and home economics.

Short Course Trains Home-Makers. COLUMBIA, Mo., Oct. 21.—If the surest way to a man's heart is still through his stomach, as they used to say it was, every year will be leap year for the girls and women of Missouri who add to their training for home-making by taking the Short Course in Home Economics for Women, offered every fall and winter at the University of Missouri. The session this year will be from November 1 to December 22. The only requirement for entrance is an age of at least 16 years, and the work is planned to be of practical value.

The course in food preparation, for example, is to teach the girl to select food intelligently, cook it palatably, and serve it attractively. Meal planning is taught so that cooks can satisfy the needs of the family group, keep the family well and strong, and save money at the same time—a difficult combination.

In the elementary sewing course a suit of underwear and a simple dress are planned and made. A study of the dress problem is given to insure getting the best value for the money, selecting materials and designs properly, caring for clothing, and making repairs.

Other courses are in home care of the sick, household management, millinery, trade dressmaking, farm poultry management, farm dairying, and vegetable gardening.

Dr. O. D. Grinstead, deputy state veterinarian, is out in a warning to the farmer this week against permitting hogs to follow cattle that are being fed fodder. He says that he has had a number of deaths the past week from the above cause.

W. A. Sharp is enjoying his second crop of raspberries for this year as are others.

R. U. Webber, of LaPlata, has originated a new breed of hogs—the Herefords—which bid fair to become as popular with stockmen as the cattle by that name. The new swine have white faces and other markings similar to those of the cattle.

According to farmers in town Saturday the Hessian fly pest is causing considerably worry as are also the chinch bugs. It seems that a large majority of them have sown their wheat and as the warm weather has brought it up very fast, it is serving as a hotbed for millions of bugs and flies. As there have been no heavy frosts to kill them off it is feared that the wheat will be sufficiently large and heavy to protect them when the freezes come. On the other hand the weather has been ideal for the corn harvesters and the optimistic ones are continuing to look upon the bright side.—Centralia Courier.
