

# WHISKEY WAS DESTROYED TUESDAY P. M.

The destroying of about one-half pint of bottled-in-bond whiskey by R. M. Painter, City Marshal, Tuesday afternoon was the final act of the city administration in its last campaign against intoxicants in the city. Sunday afternoon, two men were arrested in a Ford roadster after they had near-accidents several times. They were found to be in an intoxicated condition and Mr. Painter took them to the city jail where they spent the night.

Monday morning when they appeared before Judge J. A. Weaver, they gave their residence as Wells-ville. One was fined \$55.00 and costs on a charge of driving a car in an intoxicated condition, and the other \$25.00 and costs on a charge of drunkenness.

The whiskey destroyed Tuesday was taken from the prisoners and is said to be the balance of a quart that was purchased on prescription at Wells-ville. When it was submitted in evidence Judge Weaver stated it was the first time liquor had been in court during the three or four years he had been on the bench. It was destroyed under instructions of Harry Stocks, City Attorney.

"I want this to be a warning to those living in the surrounding towns that Mexico is a poor place to come to for this kind of action," said Mr. Painter. "The administration insists on maintaining the high standard of the city as a good place to live in and hoodlums will not be tolerated."

## ADMINISTRATION BUYS TEN-TON STREET ROLLER

With the expenditure of \$4,000 for a street roller, the administration feels it has made one of the best moves for the city tax-payers this spring. This roller, which weighs ten tons, should be here within a few days and will materially lower the cost of placing the dirt streets of the city to the highest point of efficiency.

A substantial part of the purchase price of the roller will be returned to the city in rental, for its use in rolling the paving on East Liberty Street which will be completed this spring; and it is expected that other rentals, when it is not needed for city use, will eventually pay for it and net a profit besides.

With a machine of this kind it is said streets can be put in a much better condition to withstand wear than with former methods and the administration wants every property owner to have just as good streets as he desires.

It is the present plan of the Street and Alleys Committee to grade roll and oil all streets that received similar treatment last year, and the members would like to hear from those who would like their streets improved, but who are not on this list.

# LARGE SAVING TO THE COUNTY FOR THE X-RAY

With the installation of the new X-Ray equipment at Audrain Hospital, the members of the county court feel the members of the hospital board has made a remarkable saving to the taxpayers of the county as the final cost was only \$3,850, when it was first thought it would cost \$5,200. The prices eighteen months ago have been materially lowered and this made possible the saving.

The room in which the new equipment is located is known as "The Whitcomb X-Ray Room," in honor of the late Major Frederick Whitcomb, who left a considerable sum to be used for the purchase of this equipment. This money paid all but \$1,700 of the entire costs, so the county is paying but a small part of what was originally expected.
