

Mexico's Newest Monument To Progress

WHEN the present additions are completed to Amanda Hospital, Mexico will have one of the finest privately owned hospitals in the state. It will have twenty-three beds and plenty of room for eight nurses besides providing all offices for Dr. P. E. Coll whose downtown offices will be discontinued.

All patients will be quartered on the second floor where the operating room is located as well as a diet kitchen, a sewing room, chart room, etc.

The new additions to Amanda hospital consists of a left wing and a "T" extending back from the main part of the present building. It will have two stories and a basement, absolutely fireproof.

The left wing is to be 32 feet wide and 56 feet long and the "T" will be 32 feet by 50 feet. With its setting of 192 feet on East Jackson Street and 240 feet on Hord Street, Amanda Hospital will be as pleasant and comfortable as any patient should wish.

The basement will have a large laundry, cold storage room, boiler room and coal room, with plenty of room for further growth.

The first floor will have Dr. Coll's private offices at the front of the

new wing while at the back will be the laboratory and the X-Ray rooms which include a room for storing plates which will be all lead line and also a dark room for developing the pictures when exposed.

In Dr. Coll's private offices will be located a complete electrical equipment which will include all forms of high-frequency treatments, the Alpine Sun Light, etc.

The X-Ray room will have the next largest machine of this kind made and with a complete laboratory equipment and \$7,000 worth of Radium, Amanda Hospital will be equipped to care for all inoperable cases and skin diseases as well as those in the surgical class.

The balance of the first floor will be devoted to executive offices, an dining room, kitchen, commissary, etc. A corridor six feet wide will extend the full width of the building from east to west.

The operating room will be at the north end of the "T" with its entire north side in glass. It will be all tile and connects with a sterilizing room, a wash room and dressing room for the surgeon. Across the front of the main part will be a pleasant balcony for the convalescent. An Otis automatic elevator large enough

to carry a full sized bed will run from the basement to the second floor.

In 1918 Amanda Hospital was first established when Dr. Coll remodeled an old residence on the present grounds. In 1920 a semi-fire proof addition was made both in front of the old building and at the right. When work was started on the new additions this year the old residence was entirely removed. Fully equipped it will represent an investment of about \$125,000. It will cost approximately \$2,000 a month to run it when opened this autumn, it is said.

Amanda Hospital received its name from a committee of friends of Dr. Coll who named it after his aged mother who at 82 years of age now lives at Perry, Missouri. The committee was: J. E. Martin, Charles Carpenter, Oscar Hurnfeld, Hugh Sprout and Joe Wilkins.

Each year Dr. Coll spends a part of the summer taking post graduate work and this year will find him making a special study of Radium treatment. He has had 2 months at Cleveland, 2 months at the New York Post Graduate Hospital, 2 months at John Hopkins and 13 months at Chicago. He is still undecided where he will spend his time this year.
