JOHN V. DUTY DIES AT HOME HERE TUESDAY

John V. Duty died at his home on North Abert Street in this city at 9:30 o'clock Tuesday evening after an illness of several weeks.

Mr. Duty was born in Franklin County, Ill., on September 20, 1863, and moved to Audrain County in 1882 and has resided in Mexico for the last thirty years. In 1889 he was married to Miss Amanda Goacher. To this union were born two children, Roy and Rolla V. Rolla V., the youngest son, died in Camp Funston during the World War.
His wife died on June 5, 1902 and on September 18, 1912 he was married to Mrs. Addie Ferguson of Mexico, who survives him.
Mr. Duty leaves to mourn his death his wife and one son, Roy Duty, of Roodhouse, Ill., two sisters, Mrs. James Goacher, of Jacksonville, Ill.; and Mrs. W. H. Westrope of Mexico; three brothers, W. C. Duty of Mexico; Charles S. Duty of Udell, Ia.; and Edward Duty of California.

He was a devout member of the Baptist Church and a Maccabee and was a man who was loved by all who knew him. He will be missed by a large circle of friends.

The funeral services will be conducted at the Baptist Church Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock by the Rev. J. H. Hughes and burial will be in Elmwood Cemetery. The pallbearers will be E. A. Shannon, T. J. Marshall, H. F. Neely, B. M. Bush, J. W. Wright and Frank Pimpel.
