

DEATHS

The funeral services of Charles Wesley Lewis, who died suddenly at his home here early Saturday afternoon were held at 3:30 Monday afternoon from the home on South Clark street. The Rev. C. A. Mitchell and the Rev. J. S. Jesse conducted the services. The active pall bearers were: W. W. Johnson, Frank Bickley, R. E. Miller, J. B. Woolery, William Mason, Charles Powell and Basil

Price. The honorary pall bearers were: C. F. Clark, Judge J. A. Guthrie, Captain Burris, Charles Householder, J. G. Livingston and A. D. Jackson.

Chas. W. Lewis was born in St. Louis county September 3rd, 1846 and was educated in the county schools in the vicinity of his home. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. James H. Lewis. Mr. Lewis' mother came to Audrain county in 1863 and settled on a farm six miles northwest of this city; his father having died when he was thirty years old. C. W. Lewis, when he was 18 years old, in 1865, traveled overland in search of gold to California, and experienced a number of thrilling encounters with Indians in one of which a number of his party was killed. He returned to Audrain county a few years afterward and started in the stock raising business.

He moved to this city in 1904 but continued his stock business until a few years ago when his health failed. He married Miss Mary E. Sims, of one of Audrain's pioneer families, and who died several years ago. He was a director of the Southern bank of Mexico many years as well as a member of the Hardin College board. He was an Elk and a director of the old Mexico Fair.

He is survived by the following children: Mrs. William Creasey of this county; Mrs. Latney Barnes, of Amarilla, Texas; Miss Anne and Miss Lulu Lewis of Mexico, and Austin Lewis, also of this city. The following brothers also survive him, Geo. A. Lewis of this city, William Lewis of Colorado; another brother, Judge J. A. Lewis, died recently.

He is also survived by the following grandchildren: William, Annie Dean and Mary Elizabeth Lewis, children of Mr. and Mrs. Austin Lewis.

Mr. Lewis was one of the substantial citizens of the community and held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. His farming and stock interests was extensive. He was a man of fine Christian character who possessed a host of friends who will join the Ledger in mourning his death.

Word was received in Mexico Monday morning of the death of Mrs. E. N. Davis in Little Rock, Ark., after a long illness. Mrs. Davis was Miss Mason Wise before her marriage and had a number of friends in Mexico, having been born and reared in Callaway county. The message did not give any particulars or details of the funeral other than that burial will be in Little Rock.

Mrs. Davis was the sister of Mrs. Dan Dudley of Mexico and a sister-in-law of Mrs. M. R. Wise. The following sisters also survive her: Mrs. E. A. Lawrence of Saxton; Mrs. George Craig of McCreedie; Mrs. Ed. Hammitt of Huntsville; Mrs. A. R. Hammitt of Kansas City and Mrs. Walter Irvin of Little Rock.
