336 SQUARE MILES

SHOWN IN PHOTO

TAKEN FROM AIR WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The taking of an airplane photograph showing 336 square miles on films 100 feet long, the largest picture ever made, was announced yesterday by the Bureau of Mines.

It was taken 15,000 feet above sea level by army aviators, over the Salt Creek and Teapot Oil fields in Wyoming. It required 450 mosaics and sixteen hours of flying to do the job.
